1. **Regular registration in the Senior College:** If you will have  
completed the Junior college requirements at the end of  
this quarter and if you desire to enter the Senior College

2. **Provisional registration in the Senior College:** If you will  
have 90 credits and 90 honor points and will have almost but
