LECTURE ON SWEDISH GEOLOGY

Baron Gerard de Geer, Professor at the University of Stockholm, is in Minnesota studying the geology of some glacial clays, in comparison with those which have been studied in Sweden. It is expected that the Baron will give an illustrated lecture at the University, on the results of his investigations in Sweden. This will be delivered in English and illustrated by a number of lantern slides. It will probably be given in Room 210, Pillsbury Hall, Friday afternoon at 1:30. All who are interested in geology should plan to hear this lecture.
