PEACE TREATY REFERENDUM

In coöperation with the Intercollegiate Treaty Referendum Committee of New York City, this University will conduct a referendum on Tuesday, January 13.

Every college and university in the country is asked to take a vote of its faculty on the one hand, and its student body on the other, in which each member of the college community will vote yes or no on one of the following four propositions:

PROPOSITION I.—I favor the ratification of the League and Treaty, without amendments or reservations.

PROPOSITION II.—I am opposed to the ratification of the League and the Treaty in any form.

PROPOSITION III.—I am in favor of the ratification of the Treaty and the League, but only with the specific reservations as voted by the majority of the Senate.

PROPOSITION IV.—I favor any compromise on the reservations, which will make possible immediate ratification of the Treaty and the League.

At a meeting of the Administrative Committee of the Senate held Wednesday morning, it was voted that, to assist the All-University Student Council in completing the student vote in the straw ballot on the League of Nations, they be allowed not to exceed fifteen minutes of class time Tuesday, January 13, in any classes selected by the Council in each college. Representatives of the Council will furnish the ballots and confer with the instructors concerned.
