WINTER ENROLLMENT DIPS As expected, winter quarter enrollment at UMD dropped slightly from the record number of students for the same quarter in 1982. The total University of Minnesota system had a similar decline. Winter enrollment at UMD is 7,124 students, down one percent from a year ago.
