CONVENTION TO BE HELD OCT. 27-29

Y. W. C. A. ANNOUNCE THEIR PLANS FOR COMING MEETING.

Many national officers will be present—Meetings will be held at City Association Building.

The State Convention of the Young Women's Christian Association will be held in Minneapolis, October 27-29. All meetings will take place in the City Association Building, 87 7th St. S.

Miss Frances Bridges, national student secretary, and Miss Esther Anderson, national religious work secretary, will both be in attendance at the conference.

The exercises will begin Friday afternoon, Oct. 27th, with a reception at the home of Katharine Lyman, who is chairman of the convention committee.

Friday evening there will be an address by Rev. G. E. Albrecht, in the Trinity Church, eighth street.

Beginning at nine o'clock, Saturday morning, sectional meetings, at which college work will be discussed, will be held till noon, when luncheon will be served in the building. In the afternoon there will be a talk by Miss Bridges, who will submit the work of the summer conference.

Sunday afternoon at 4 o'clock, Miss Anderson will hold a platform meeting at the Association Building, and in the evening a speech by Miss Bridges, given at Westminster church, will conclude the conference.

IOWA FRESHMEN EXPECT VICTORY

TEAM IS REPORTED TO BE VERY FAST AND HEAVY.

Iowa Coach believes speed of his team will defeat Gopher Freshmen.—Frykman to be temporary captain.

The weather yesterday proved a serious setback in the development of the freshman eleven for the coming contest with the first year Iowans.

Latest reports from Iowa go to show that if Harris is to have a victorious team Saturday, every available minute will have to be utilized. The Hawkeyes are described as a heavy team possessing at the same time great speed.

The strong backers of the freshman team are a little anxious about the outcome of the freshman debut in the "Big Nine," but predict that Harris will spring a team and new plays that will far outclass the form shown in their last game.

"Sig" yesterday refused to give out the line-up for tomorrow, probably because some changes or switching in (Continued on page 3.)

MINNESOTA STANDS FIRST.

So far this season the Gophers have scored more points than any team in the U. S. Minnesota's machine has worked on short halves throughout and still has piled up a grand total of 253 points against its opponents and has not been scored on.

In the west Michigan follows in second place with 136 points and Wisconsin is third with 150 points. Chicago, Nebraska, Northwestern, and Illinois have been scored on by opponents. Of course these scores do not show that the gopher team is the best football team in the United States by any means.

The east does not care for high scores and the teams are held back. All of these scores have been made in the practice season, but in this work the gophers seem to have a shade the best of it.

JOINT CONCERT DOUBTFUL.

The joint concert to be given Nov. 4 by the Minnesota and Wisconsin Glee and Mandolin clubs cannot be arranged for this year because the Auditorium has already been engaged for a concert on Dec. 17 by the Minnesota clubs. All the other theaters are booked for the date wanted and the venture is not sufficiently secure financially to warrant the buying off of any one of the companies holding that date.

The Glee and Mandolin Clubs intend to start earlier next year and make the joint concert a feature for the Wisconsin-Minnesota football night.

MAGAZINE OFFICER MAKES STATEMENT

MANAGING EDITOR CHRISTIANSON OUTLINES PLAN FOR MAG.

System as outlined by present board to take effect at once.—Editors to nominate candidates.

In response to many queries in reference to change in the election of Magazine editors, which appeared in Wednesday's issue, the Daily has secured this official communication from the managing editor:

"This afternoon at 1:20 the subscribers to the Minnesota Magazine will meet in McClumpha's lecture room to elect two associate editors. These two must be chosen from a list of six men nominated by the Board. These nominees are Rodney West, Paul Spooner, Henry Mackall, Roy Smith, James Watts and Paul Stratton. The subscribers will have the option of rejecting this list of nominees and demanding a new list. They may continue to reject until the Board shall submit a list that shall be acceptable. Every student, alumnus or faculty member of the University who is a subscriber to the Magazine shall have one vote.

It shall be the policy of the Board to continue this principle of election in the future, although the particular plan according to which the principle shall be carried into effect, may be varied in small details, if future experience shall prove changes necessary. If the present experiment works satisfactorily the Board will submit next spring a list of twenty or more names, if men from the present junior class, from which list, the subscribers may elect eight men to constitute next year's board.

"In making its selection of nominees the present Board will consider the quality of work submitted by them for the Magazine in the past, the interest they have taken in the publication, and their general executive ability.

PRESIDENT NORTHROP'S ADDRESS.

The announcement that President Northrop would speak in chapel Wednesday evening, brought out an immense throng of students which filled the room to overflowing.

"University Life" was the President's subject. He spoke broadly on the duties of a college student in connection with athletic, social, political and other phases of college life. He closed with an inspiring exhortation to the young man of today, to grasp the opportunities placed within his reach.

UNIVERSITY TEACHERS' CERTIFICATE.

Applicants for this certificate will hereafter be required to show 1) a record of scholarship during the four college years indicated by an average mark of "good" according to the standards established by the faculty of the College of Science, Literature and the Arts;

(2) A recommendation from at least one department of the college, certifying that the applicant is qualified for high school teaching of studies falling within its scope;

(3) Satisfactory completion of Course I in Philosophy, Courses I and II in Education and one other three-hour course either in Education or in Child Psychology.

Candidates for the University Teachers' Certificate are advised to take Course I in Philosophy during the Sophomore year and Courses I and II in Education during the Junior year. Their attention is called also to the "Teachers' Courses" offered in various departments.
