IV REPORT OF THE ADMINISTRATIVE COMMITTEE**a. Actions Reported for Ratification**

The following actions have been taken since the last meeting of the Senate and are reported for ratification:

I. *Replacement of Library Books.* Voted to approve the following regulation as recommended by Mr. Walter:

Books, periodicals, maps and similar material retained in or lent to colleges or departments outside the general library at the University or its approved branches shall be confined to such as are in constant use in the daily work of the college or department. The cost of any and all replacements of these books due to loss or misuse shall be charged against the general supply funds of the college or department to which they are lent or in which they are retained.

b. Actions Reported for Information

I. *Honorary Degrees.* Voted to authorize a special committee to advise with the President in the preparation of a report requested by the Board of Regents on the granting of honorary degrees.

II. *Text Book Approval.* Voted to approve Professor Shepardson's text book on Elements of Electrical Engineering for use in college classes.

III. *American Passports and Visas.* Voted to authorize the Secretary to write to Senators and Congressional representatives from this district urging a reduction in the cost of American passports and visas, in accordance with a request received from T. B. Dawson, calling the attention of the University to the present practice as it affects scholars and professional people going abroad to study.

IV. *Extra Quota Students.* The President called attention to the fact that the University of Minnesota had been placed on the approved list for extra quota students by the Bureau of Immigration and to the special obligations of the University with respect to this privilege.

V. *Text Book Approval.* Voted to approve a text book by Dr. Black on Introduction to Production Economics for use in college classes.

VI. *All-University Freshman Year.* Voted to approve the general plan for the Freshman Year and to proceed at once with such steps as may be necessary to further develop the Junior College, giving immediate attention to the organization and administration of the All-University Freshman Year. Voted to authorize the appointment of a committee consisting of the deans of the colleges accepting students direct from high schools and the Chairman of the Senate Committee on Education to consider the question of the freshman curriculum and program.

VII. *Record of Scholarships, Prizes, etc.* The following general plan for the recording, approval, and notification of recipients of scholarships and prizes was approved, with the understanding that copies of the plan would be sent to each member of the Committee and the modifications of the details might be made.

"1. Each dean shall send to the President's office a type-written statement covering the name of the prize, name of the donor, nature and amount of any such awards in his college. (See statements in General Information bulletin.)

2. Such information shall be transferred to cards in the President's office on which shall also be placed the name of the recipient each year.

3. When it has been decided to whom the prize shall be awarded each year the dean of the college shall prepare triplicate forms (to be furnished by the President's office) and submit the recommendation to the President's office in the same way as members of the staff are recommended for appointment. After this recommendation has been approved by the President one copy will be retained in the President's office, one copy will be signed and sent to the Comptroller's office, and one copy signed and returned to the dean. The copy forwarded to the Comptroller will constitute his authority to pay the money awarded to the person named on the blank.

4. Notification will be sent from the President's office to those to whom the prizes have been awarded.

5. Since these prizes have already been accepted by the Regents, the above recommendations will not be included in the docket for Regents approval.

The suggestions above apply to all scholarships, fellowships, prizes, etc. in connection with which money is paid as a reward of merit and not for services rendered to the University."

V REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE RELATIONS OF THE UNIVERSITY TO OTHER INSTITUTIONS OF LEARNING

Your Committee on the Relations of the University to Other Institutions of Learning begs leave to submit the following recommendations:

1. That Park Region Luther College, Fergus Falls, be tentatively recognized for one year subject to the following conditions: (a) satisfactory secondary school work, (b) improvement in facilities for history instruction, and (c) improvement in library.
2. That Itasca Junior College, Coleraine be accredited for two years of work.
3. That St. Mary's College, Winona, be accredited for two years of work.
4. That the Breck School, St. Paul, be placed on the list of accredited secondary schools.
5. That St. Anthony School for Girls, Minneapolis, be placed on the list of accredited secondary schools subject to further inspection.

VI REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON BUSINESS AND RULES

XIII STUDENT'S WORK

There shall be a standing committee on Students' Work. It shall consist of the Dean of Student Affairs, who shall be ex-officio chairman, the Dean of Women, the chairmen of the Students' Work Committees of the colleges and collegiate schools and Clerk of the Senate, who shall be ex-officio secretary. The duties of the Committee shall be to correlate and harmonize, so far as may be consistent with the special needs and conditions of the various colleges, the administration of the students' work of these colleges with the administration of the University Senate rules and regulations dealing with students' work.

VII REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETICS

To the University Senate:

Your Committee on Intercollegiate Athletics begs leave to submit the following report for the year 1923-24:

Twenty-six meetings of the committee were held. The report last year indicated the various activities of the committee in supporting intramural athletics, standardizing procedure in the Conference, appointments on staff, health service relationships, M requirements, conferences with student work committees, codification of rules, appointment of student managers, fixing prices for student tickets, acquisition of property, reorganization of business management, eligibility problems, etc., etc.

The committee's work this year while necessarily including many of the items of last year's program had in addition problems which the stadium and the new field presented. The committee found itself confronted with the necessity of financing the installation of dressing rooms, team quarters, etc. in the stadium involving expenditures amounting to approximately \$63,000.00. Then there was the problem of the field itself which had to be in playing condition by October 4. The entire field had to be built, seeded or sodded, and nursed carefully through the summer. After the first grass appeared, creeping bent was planted to insure a firmer turf.

Ticket problems, growing out of the possible necessity of playing the first games on Northrop Field and the later ones in the stadium, confronted the committee.

Conference regulations were a source of lengthy discussion. Provision for the following sports was made: cross country running, football, soccer, basket ball, swimming, boxing, wrestling, gymnastics, hockey, baseball, track, tennis, golf, and rifle shooting.

The following table shows the number of students who tried out for the various teams, the number of intercollegiate contests, and the number of students who won the M in each sport during the year 1923-24:

Recommendations:

Conference regulations.—The Conference Committee has been rewriting the Conference regulations governing eligibility. Certain of these regulations have been distinctly changed in the revision; hence, must be adopted by the members of the Conference before becoming effective.

I. *Rule 9* was formerly worded "A student becoming ineligible through delinquency in studies may regain his eligibility by removing such delinquencies by doing one full year of work in one year of residence, provided he shall have removed any delinquency which his college requires to be removed."

Revision. "A student becoming ineligible through delinquency in studies may regain his eligibility by (a) removing such delinquencies (b) doing one full year of work in the year of residence prior to his participation thereafter in any sport."

To remove any delinquency under (b) however, a student must have removed any delinquency which his college requires to be removed as a prerequisite to graduation.

Your committee recommends the adoption of the revised rule.

II. *Old Rule 4.* "No person having been a member of any college during any year and having been in attendance less than one college half year shall be permitted to play in any intercollegiate contest thereafter until he shall have been in attendance six consecutive calendar months."

Revision. "No student having been a member of any college athletic team during any semester or quarter and not having continued in residence through that period, shall be permitted to play in any intercollegiate contest thereafter until he shall have been in residence a semester or quarter."

Your committee recommends the adoption of the revised rule.

III. *Old Rule 13.* "A student shall be ineligible to represent his college in athletic contests who engages in such contests as a representative of any athletic organization not connected with his college, whether in term time or vacation."

Revision. (Section 1.) "A student shall be ineligible to represent his college in athletic contests who, after matriculation in any college engages in such contests as a representative of any athletic organization not connected with his college."

(Section 2.) "Occasional games during vacation on teams strictly amateur are not prohibited, provided no admission is charged. A strictly amateur team is one no member of which receives remuneration for his services."

Your committee recommends the adoption of the revised rule.

IV. *Old Rule 6.* "No student shall participate in intercollegiate athletics for more than three years in the aggregate; and any member of a college team who plays during any part of an intercollegiate contest does thereby participate in that sport for the year."

Revision. "No student shall participate in intercollegiate athletics for more than three years in the aggregate; participation, however brief, during any college year in any intercollegiate event shall cause that year to count as one of the three allotted years. For the purpose of this rule a college year shall consist of successive twelve month periods following matriculation."

The committee recommends that the Senate decline to accept this rule and further recommends that the Senate recommend the following rewording of Rule 6 if a rewording be desired:

"A student may begin his participation with any term, and may continue his participation for six semesters, if no other rule of the Conference is violated. No academic year in which he does not participate shall be counted. Participation, however, brief, during his athletic year in any intercollegiate event shall count as one of the three allotted years."

V. *Baseball.* On March 30, 1922, the Senate voted to reinstate baseball as an intercollegiate sport for a period of three years.

Your committee recommends that baseball be recommended permanently as an intercollegiate sport.
