THE RECREATIONAL PROGRAM

The program of extra-curricular activities is provided for Summer Session students in the interests of a balanced ration of work and play. It replaces those activities which during other quarters of the year are under the auspices of student organizations which do not function during the summer. An attempt is made to make the program as varied as possible. Physical exercise is given a large place, and as will be seen in another column there is ample provision for the exercise of every muscle on the campus. Literary and artistic impulses, and still more academic interests are cared for by a series of lectures and convocation addresses and by concerts and recitals. The social side is provided for in a series of Saturday evening parties, while the excursions furnish an admirable opportunity to become acquainted with interesting features of Twin City life.

The entire program is maintained by and for students. All should feel that it is theirs to enjoy. The Summer Session office will welcome all suggestions for the improvement of the program or for the introduction of events not now planned.

VISIT FILTRATION PLANT ON SATURDAY

The means by which Minneapolis cleans, filters, and otherwise purifies the water of the Mississippi River—at least a portion of it!—so that it is usable for all purposes, is an interesting physical and chemical process. The work is done at a plant on Columbia Heights, in the northeast section of the city. A party of Summer Session members will make a visit to the plant on Saturday afternoon of this week, leaving the Library at one o'clock. Every part of the process will be inspected and the chemist in charge of the work will give a complete description of apparatus and procedure. It is an opportunity that should not be missed.

UNIVERSITY ZOOLOGICAL MUSEUM

We hope it is not too late to call to the attention of summer visitors the Zoological Museum of the University. This collection is housed in the Zoological Building on Washington Ave. and is open to the public every day except Sunday, until 5:30 p.m.

While the collection is yet not as extensive as it is hoped it will be, it is in quality quite unsurpassed by anything in the country. The mountings and displays have been planned and executed by artists, in line with the work done in such institutions as the Field Museum and the New York Museum of Natural History. Some of them, particularly those in which various Minnesota locales and typical birds and animals are represented, have attracted national attention. A visit to the museum will be well worth the time of any student.

TWO-PIANO RECITAL

Friday afternoon at 4:30 the members of the Summer Session will have the opportunity of hearing a recital by Paul Oberg and Winifred Reichmuth, both of whom are graduates of the University of Minnesota Music School. Two Concert Grand Pianos will be used in the recital. Both of the artists are well known in local music circles, and Mr. Oberg has been connected with WCCO as Program Director and as accompanist. The recital is the only one of its kind to be offered this session, and we are sure that the members of the Summer Session will enjoy it.

ATHLETIC RECREATION

Athletic activities on the recreation program for the Summer Session students will include golf, tennis, baseball, playground ball, volley ball, handball, horseshoes, squash and swimming. Playing space and equipment except racquets, clubs and balls for tennis and golf, are provided and the whole program is supervised and directed as needed.

Golf

The University Recreation Field golf course is open to all members of the summer session, students or faculty, if they secure a permit card from Room 110 University Armory. The club house is located on Cleveland Avenue, St. Paul, six-tenths of a mile north of the Agricultural College buildings. There is a stop at Cleveland Avenue on the inter-campus car line for those who wish to use that line in reaching the course. The grounds fee is 35 cents (nine holes); coupon books good for ten rounds are sold for \$3.00.

Tennis

The University tennis courts on Washington Avenue are open to students of the Summer Session on presentation of tennis privilege cards. These cards are issued free of charge to students presenting bursar's fee receipts at Room 110 University Armory. During registration days these cards will be issued in the lobby of the Registrar's office.) These courts are provided with nets and kept in perfect condition by daily attention, and are considered the finest courts in the Twin Cities.

Members of the faculty and non-students may procure tennis cards for a fee of \$1.00 per summer term at the University Tennis courts.

Ball

For those desiring to organize teams in the various games of ball a schedule of games will be organized, to run throughout the Summer Session. Groups should communicate with the Intramural Athletics office, which will handle the schedule.

Tournaments

Tournaments in tennis singles and doubles, golf, horseshoes, volley ball, and playground ball are being arranged. Posted on the athletic bulletin board in the University Post Office is a large registration card for those who wish to enter the individual tournaments. Registrations close Wednesday, August 1st. Gold and silver medals are awarded to the winner and the runner up.
