U Dentists Begin 4-Quarter Basis

Coffey Approves Accelerated Program to Aid War Effort

The School of Dentistry will go on a four-quarter basis starting this June.

President Walter C. Coffey gave his approval to the accelerated program yesterday. The dentistry faculty had previously recommended the acceleration as a means of making dental graduates available at an earlier date for service in the dental corps of the army and navy.

Students now enrolled will begin next year's work in June. Freshmen, however, will not be admitted until fall quarter.

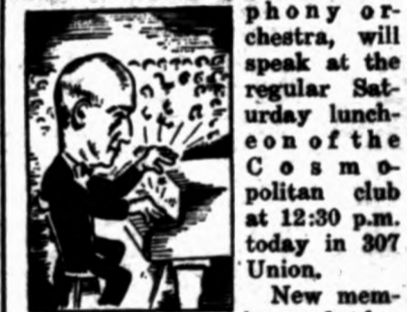
Dentistry acceleration parallels the four-quarter program already being followed by the Medical school.

Commissions as second lieutenants in the army medical administration corps are now available to all dental students who can meet qualifications, W. F. Lasby, dean of the School of Dentistry, said yesterday.

Students receiving these commissions will not be called into active service until they are appointed first lieutenants upon graduation.

First U Coed Is Dead at 90

Enrolled at the University in 1869, she took a boat part way on the Mississippi in order to get to campus.

Later when other girls enrolled they all bought a pony for the trip to campus because their long skirts got wet in the deep grass near the river.

Mrs Dunn had to leave the University before graduating because of poor eyesight.

Plenty of Bread

No Wheatless Days Needed--Jesness

Civilians in this war will not have to have "wheatless" days, Oscar B. Jesness, chief of the division of the agricultural economics, said at the America Goes to War lecture yesterday in Northrop auditorium.

"We have today an actual wheat surplus. We are wondering what to do with the wheat on hand and there is a need for curtailment. There will be plenty of bread."

But agricultural goods on which there is need for consumption curtailment, he said, include sugar, oils and fats and wool.

"There is no serious sugar shortage," he said,

"but some selfish persons have tried to buy sugar beyond their immediate needs. That is an important reason why rationing is necessary. We must bear in mind that if we rush into the market every time there is a rumor of an impending shortage we are creating what we are trying to avoid."

In summing up the agricultural goods situation, Dr Jesness said that there is no serious food shortage in sight.

"We stand in no danger of starving as do some of the peoples in the world," he told the audience, "but there is need for curtailment on some commodities."

Lasts Only 4 Innings; Doubleheader Today

Pitching beautifully for four innings, Bill Anderson was prevented from hurling what might have resulted in a Minnesota victory over Northwestern by rain yesterday, but he will probably get another chance today when the Gophers meet the Wildcats in a doubleheader starting at 1:30 p.m. on Northrop field.

The lanky hurler held Northwestern to two hits while Minnesota picked up four hits and two walks off Northwestern's Ray Hoblick. Otto Graham, erstwhile griddy and cager, popped out to Anderson twice.

Don Crassweller, Anderson, Phil Canterbury and Bob Polski each got a single for the Gophers while big Ed Hirsch collected a single and Steve Meschuk a triple for the Wildcats.

Coach Dave MacMillan changed his batting order yesterday, putting Jerry Stewart, leftfielder, in the leadoff spot.

Minnesota lost a good chance to score on Northwestern in the first inning. After Stewart flied out, Crassweller reached first on a well-placed bunt. Burkstrand popped out to Hoblick and both Warner and Captain Jack Langan walked, filling the bases. Canterbury took a lunge at one of Hoblick's pitches but only got a piece of it and fouled out to Catcher Gargas.

The Gophers came close to scoring again in the fourth frame when, with one down, Canterbury hit a single to right field and Polski banged out a one-base hit. Attempting to reach third on Polski's hit, Canterbury was tagged out. Exel flied out, ending the inning.

Geankoplis Leads Gopher Netmen Against Cyclones

Minnesota and Iowa State will tangle in a toss-up tennis meet at 2 p.m. today on the Fourth street courts.

Each team has one victory to its credit this season and each has been defeated by Nebraska, 4-2.

Phil Brain's Gophers have been rained out of practice much of this week but other than that they are at full strength. Christie Geankoplis holds the No. 1 position and Hank Nosek is in the No. 2 spot. Warren Skon and Joe Keselik fill out the lineup.

The Cyclones have a veteran team headed by letterman Dick Young, Lawrence Gilley and Ken Donelson, who play No. 2 and No. 3 positions, have not lost a dual match yet this season.

Donelson is an Iowa state high school champion. Milton Salzman, a sophomore numeral winner, plays No. 4.

Kenneth Silgen, who has recovered from his side injury, will play No. 1 doubles with Nosek, while Geankoplis and Wally Anderson will take No. 2.

Iowa State's doubles teams are Donelson and Gilley, No. 1, and Young and Salzman, No. 2.

Bleachers for 300 spectators have been set up near the first court and yesterday 350 yards of canvas back drop was put up around the first six courts. The canvas makes it easier for the players to see the ball and has some value as a windbreak.

All-Star Softball Game Set for Ag Royal Day

Trackmen in Quadrangular Today; 'Purdue or Minnesota,' Says Kelly

The team left at 11 p.m. yesterday and will arrive in Lafayette at 12:30 p.m. today after a short stop-over in Chicago.

Captain Burt Anthony will lead the strong Boilermaker team in the dashes today and along with other Purdue stars, will probably have the edge on Minnesota in the track events.

Iowa's two stars at this meet will be Lee Farmer, who nosed out Dick Kelley in the preliminaries of the Drake Relays last week, and Milt Kuhl, who will give Bob Fitch and Ray Milberg some stiff opposition in the weight events.

Northwestern's Don Clawson will also enter the weight events, and the Wildcat captain, Don Smith, will have a good chance to take the high jump.

The Golds trounced the Greens, 20-0, last Saturday and with most of the men from the first two teams playing under Coach Wilkinson again today, they are strongly favored to repeat last week's victory.

Coach John Roning's Greens will be made up of sophomores and the third and fourth stringers.

Head Coach George Hauser said yesterday that the game will be open to the Amateur Sportsman's club and its guests.

Both the Greens and the Golds ran through a few formations in a light signal practice yesterday and Bill Daley and Herman Frickey drilled on forward passing again.

Coach Wilkinson's Gold outfit will start the game with Herb Hein and Bill Baumgartner at the ends; Captain Dick Wildung and Paul Mitchell, tackles; John Billman and Chuck Dellago, guards; Bob Solheim, center; Bill Garmaas, quarterback; Bill Daley, left halfback; Herman Frickey, right halfback, and Vic Kulbitski, fullback.

The Greens will probably open with Dick Burk and Roy Lilja, ends; Dick Heeren and Bill Drake, tackles; George Path and Bill Hopp, guards; Bernie Nelson, center; Jim Haley, quarterback; Bob Graiziger, fullback; Bob Sandberg, right halfback, and Joe Silovich, left halfback.
