

BENDER OF NEBRASKA SPEAKS TO HUGE MASS MEETING OF ROOTERS

Famous Half Back on Cornhuskers Eleven Speaks to Throng of Confident Students--Enthusiasm Grows Apace as Game This Afternoon Draws Nearer--Minnesota Never Quits, Spirit of Meeting

SKI-U-MAH ALL THE TIME

With loyal multitudes striving to gain entrance to the chapel which was packed long before the opening song was sung and with vocal expressions of Minnesota loyalty striving to gain egress through the windows and the doors whence even the light of heaven found difficult passage, the student-body did their part yesterday in the preparations for Nebraska's undoing. Today the rooter legions will reproduce the spirit and noise of the meeting on Northrop Field.

Jack Campbell, roused the first Ski-U-Mah with the jovial smile that lighted up his countenance when he saw the large multitude, and kept the meeting lively till the end.

Dr. Burton, the first speaker, was greeted with a spontaneous round of applause. He said in part:

"Three things must come about before the football millenium. There must be fewer peanuts and more patriotism on the grandstands; the sched-

ule of the four big games must be more satisfactorily arranged and Minnesota must play one of the big eastern teams. There is no reason why we cannot play as good a class of football as any eastern college."

Dean Jones always a favorite at mass meetings, was next called forth. He cautioned the rooters to be as loyal in defeat as in victory, in case the impossible should happen, and Nebraska should win. He said:

"No team can take a defeat better than Nebraska, and I believe they'll have a chance to demonstrate it tomorrow."

Byron H. Timberlake held the floor for a few minutes and then shouts of "Mose! We want Mose! Mose!" brought the doughty captain of the Gopher eleven to the rostrum. He promised in behalf of the team the best that was in them for this afternoon's game.

As he left the floor Campbell announced:

BOOKS WILL BE LET OUT PERHAPS

Circulating Library May be Started to Satisfy the Needs of Students

Last May it was suggested by Dr. Folwell that a circulating library be established at this college. The matter has been duly presented to the Board of Regents and now awaits their action. Other matters are before them regarding the new buildings and it is probable that this, together with the usual slow action of the Board of Control will delay the final decision.

Dr. Folwell is of the opinion that the present prohibitory rules are too sweeping as it includes many books that are rarely needed, for reference work in the Library. There are over 7000 books on the shelves that could be used in the new library, but it would be necessary to purchase between five and six thousand volumes of current literature.

Magazines would also be placed on these shelves and could be taken out with a small deposit.

The present arrangement is very unsatisfactory. The books that were kept out and caused the trouble were comparatively few. The great majority of the books in the library are books that cannot be digested between classes.

The new plan would not only eliminate the present difficulties but would open up a field for students at college that is missed more, perhaps, than any other thing, namely the reading of modern authors, and every student has some spare time that could be profitably employed along that line.

Get down from the bleachers—fall down, roll down—but get down some way and carry those fellows who honor Minnesota and you by wearing the Maroon and Gold, off from the field with as much tenderness as though they had run up an unheard of score! That is true college spirit!

Here at Minnesota we haven't had a chance to put ours to the test, and we all feel that the time is yet far distant.

But perhaps we will meet defeat one of these days.

Then, if it happens, let every one of you, you men of Minnesota, in whose hearts dwells an everlasting fire of loyalty for Maroon and Gold, who are proud to the uttermost of your being able to call the U. of M. your alma mater, get out and prove to the world, by the wild enthusiasm of your demonstrations, vocal and otherwise, that yours is the true college spirit, and that Minnesota is not the vanquished but victor, because she knows how to take defeat.

That's the spirit!

PLAYERS AND ROOTERS.

Our team is much heavier than the eleven which the Cornhuskers will put in the field this afternoon. They have shown greater speed in past years than the Nebraska eleven has shown at any time.

Thus the natural conclusion for the general student body to draw is that the game is a "lead pipe cinch for Minnesota," according to a favorite song.

But one thing in the makeup of our team seems to have been entirely forgotten, and this is that many of the men who will go into the game, are participating in their first championship struggle. In other words they are green to the many fine points of the game which comes only after years of play.

But there is no doubt that a great remedy for this defect in the team can be made up to a very great extent by the enthusiasm shown on the sidelines.

To the new man a hard game is apt to get him twisted in his signals, and make him forget all that his coach has carefully drilled into him. Then the sight of thousands of loyal fellow students, rooting and waving their colors on the side lines will bring him back to his senses.

Is this enough said?

Will every student, male and female, get out their colors and arm themselves with a huge megaphone?

These are the outward signs of college spirit and the kind which helps the men while they are on the field.

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GRINNELL SPIRIT.

"The Scarlet and Black, Grinnell's semi-weekly newspaper, recently appeared with a long account of the game with Minnesota. Grinnell's opinion of our men is well expressed in the following extract: "Minnesota played with the same earnestness she would take into a game with Chicago or Wisconsin, and Grinnell left the field with all the disappointment of overwhelming defeat buried under a profound admiration for the strength of her opponents. Two hundred pound men of respectable speed are ordinarily few and far between, but U. of M. seems to possess plenty of them."

The way in which Grinnell took her defeat is to be admired.

Capacity of Northrop Field Enough for All Time.

The new bleachers on the east side of the field were completed yesterday afternoon. They are made of hemlock and held together by iron bands.

They can be easily taken down at the end of the season and stored so as not to interfere with track work and the base ball diamond. There are seven sections with a capacity of over 3,000.

Two new rows of boxes were added below the wall along the grand stand. There are 182 of them and will accommodate over 1,100 people.
