HOOSIERS WILL FIGHT HARD FOR VICTORY SATURDAY

Indiana Game the Last for Several Players—Will Work for High Score

Minnesota students are still cogitating upon the unexpected defeat last Saturday at the hands of Carlisle, but in spite of the victory of the Indians still have faith in their team.

Minnesota has one more opportunity to prove its prowess on the gridiron. Indiana comes next Saturday. Altho the Hoosiers do not expect to defeat Minnesota they have hopes of holding the Gophers to a narrow margin, and are practising hard with this end in view.

The Minnesota eleven has started in this week with the determination of doing things to the Indiana team. A number of the men play their last game next Saturday and very naturally wish it to be an overwhelming victory for Minnesota. Minnesota is conceded the victory, but with the spirit the team now shows and continued support on the part of the student body, the tally ought to be up high in two figures.

Indiana succeeded in holding the Maroons to a score of 33 to 8 early in the season and it is up to Minnesota to better that score. The Hoosiers have, however, developed very much since they met the Maroons, and will be a much harder proposition than at that time.

ALICE SHEVLIN HALL IS NEARLY READY FOR USE

Haven of Minnesota's Long-Suffering Co-eds will Soon be Completed

Alice Shevlin Hall, which is nearly completed and ready for furnishing, will be dedicated about Thanksgiving time. The regents will then formally hand over the building to the women of Minnesota. Mr. and Mrs. Shevlin, donors of the building, will also take part in the ceremonies.

The Woman's building is thought by many to be the most beautiful on the campus, and will form a part of the artistic education of every Minnesota girl who enters it. The woodwork is finished in dark browns and mahogany colors, while the walls are tinted in rich harmonious shades of tan, brown, green, and blue. The harmonious effects and color-schemes are carried out in the carpets, curtains, and furniture, which has been designed by Bradstreets.

The living-room is the pride of the building. At one end is a handsome brick fire-place. The walls are strikingly effective, the woodwork running about half way up in the form of panels, and the upper half tinted in a rich dark blue. The finishing touch is given in the stained glass windows, presented by the League and having its monogram. This room will be furnished with one large and two small tables, large davenport and chairs, the color schemes being old blue and tobacco brown.

The basement will delight the heart of every co-ed. There are a thousand lockers, each one twice as large as those in the library. There are rows of wash-bowls and—joy untold—both hot and cold water. Mrs. Gilfillan has contributed towels. The architect, being a "mere man," seemed to consider mirrors unnecessary and omitted them, but the oversight has been discovered in time. There are also half a dozen shower baths, an innovation here.

The forward part of the basement is devoted to a kitchen and luncheon. The latter is done in brown (Continued on Editorial Page)

MINNESOTA ALUMNAE PLAN TRIBUTE TO MARIA SANFORD

Grace McKinstry Chosen to Make Oil Painting of Professor Sanford

University alumnae have set on foot a movement to purchase an oil portrait of Professor Maria Sanford, to be placed in Alice Shevlin Hall, as a fitting expression of their deep appreciation of Miss Sanford's qualities as a woman and as a promoter of education thruout the state. She has not only held the position of professor of rhetoric in the university for a period of twenty-six years, but she is widely known as a public speaker of great force and interest.

Grace McKinstry, a Minnesota woman who has won fame as a portrait painter of unusual ability, is at present at work on a portrait of Miss Sanford, which it is the purpose of those who are interested in the movement to purchase.

Miss McKinstry's portraits of Governor Ramsey, of Cushman K. Davis, of Miss Margaret Evans and of Bishops Whipple and Gilbert are well-known and are sufficient evidence that the portrait of Miss Sanford will not only be a honor to Miss Sanford and the university but an art treasure as well.

MINNESOTA LEADS

Not alone in her different colleges does Minnesota excel nor is her football team the only thing outside of the regular school work for which she is to be congratulated, for another and, if possible, more important work is that of a department little known. The Y.M.C.A. under the present leadership of Ed. Swenson, as president, and with John Sinclair to push it along, is doing a work which is scarcely realized among the college men as a whole. In another part of this issue appears a list of statistics which shows in part the magnificent work which these men with their able assistants are carrying on.

During previous years Minnesota has not even been mentioned in the list of associations which have done well. This year the association leads almost all those which were mentioned in that list and if a membership of seven hundred is secured, as is expected, the western record will probably be broken for university Y. M. C. A.'s. This brings us to another point in the story for where Minnesota is among the first of the universities in Y. M. C. A. membership it is one of the most insignificant and inadequate buildings of any of the colleges in the United States. A building movement is being started and in order to carry this on successfully there must be co-operation on the part of all the university students and this co-operation will be most effectual if it takes the form of an immense increase in membership over the present number.

This is the status of the Y. M. C. A. What is the sentiment of the college men in regard to it?
