### ADVANCED COURSE, R.O.T.C. 1921-1922

Any physically fit male student who will have, at the end of the present quarter, credit for two years military training in the R.O.T.C., the S.A.T.C., or in both combined, and who is not due to graduate from the University before June, 1923, may be enrolled in the Advanced Course R.O.T.C. for next year. Those who desire to so enroll and to attend the 1921 Advanced Camp, should consult the officer in charge of the Unit in which they desire to apply for enrollment, before May 15. Others who desire to enroll in this course should signify their intention as early as possible so that an estimate of next year's registration may be made and preparations for next year's instruction effected accordingly.
