The program is gotten up very artistically. A picture of every man on the team is given, pictures of men who have won their "M's" and the teams for many years back are reproduced in black and white.

This will be the last opportunity to get a souvenir program this season as the other large games will be played out of the city.

MAKE 668 POINTS IN 440 MINUTES

Record of the Ten Games Shows Point and a Half Per Minute

Saturday afternoon comes the climax of the season's games at home—the game with Wisconsin.

Starting in with easy contests at the beginning of the season, the game comes the termination of home games and the hardest contest to date.

So far there have been ten games played, a total of four hundred and forty minutes actual play, making an average of 44 minutes per game.

Minnesota has scored 668 points against opposing teams and has had but 12 points scored against her.

Elected

David P. Jones, '88, was elected mayor of Minneapolis, by the Republicans, receiving a majority of 545.

Judge C. B. Elliott, Ph. D., '88, at present senior district judge in Minneapolis, was elected to the State Supreme Bench altho his plurality has not yet been determined owing to the number of country towns that are late in reporting.

Al J. Smith, '90, at present U. S. District Attorney, was elected county attorney for Hennepin county.

Geo. C. Merrill, Law, '95, was made Register of Deeds by a big plurality.

Judges Dickinson, '90, and Holt, '88, were elected to the District bench in Minneapolis.

Byron H. Timberlake, '91, and Howard B. Chamberlain, '99, were both elected to the state legislature from the 39th district.

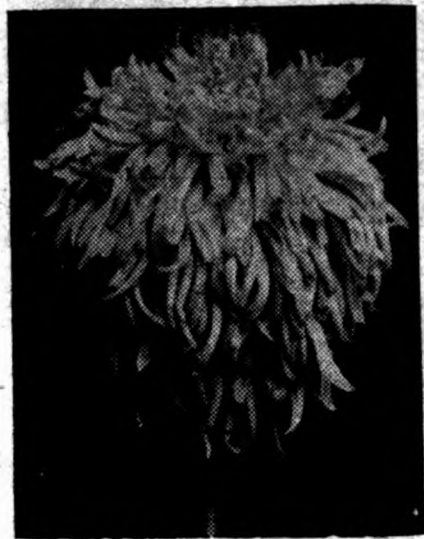
