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Duluth--- Edward de Bono, a young educator, author and lecturer who holds doctorates in medicine, philosophy and psychology, will speak at 10:30 a.m. on Tuesday (Oct. 1) in UMD's Kirby Student Center Ballroom.

"Funny Way the Mind Works" will be the topic of De Bono's talk. He will discuss the peculiar characteristics of the thinking process and explain how a person can become aware of basic habits that may be erroneous.

De Bono's book "The Five-Day Course in Thinking" was published in America in the fall of 1967 and attracted wide attention in the press and on television. He made guest appearances on several television and radio shows.

Also an inventor, De Bono has devised a 25 cent whistle to measure lung capacity (replacing a \$90 machine), a 20 cent needle and tube to determine whether a patient is in heart failure (replacing a \$2,000 machine), special glasses for night driving, and with 10 cents worth of balloons solved a complicated problem that had originally been programmed for a \$1 million computer.

The author, speaker and inventor is in his mid-thirties, and was born in Malta. He received his medical degree from the Royal University of Malta. His articles have been published in leading medical journals including the American Journal of Physiology and the British Medical Journal.

A lecturer in medicine at Cambridge University in England, De Bono was a Rhodes Scholar at Oxford and taught and did research at Oxford, London and Harvard Universities.
