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MAIL ORDERS PROMPTLY FILLED

LAST INSPECTION THIS AFTERNOON

University Cadets Drill for the Last Time Today—Appointments Announced Later.

This afternoon Morgan's Volunteers will fall in for the last drill of this year.

Under the able direction of Major Morgan the work has been brought to a very satisfactory and successful finish, as was evidenced by the fine showing the boys made Tuesday, and the praise that was given them by Gov. Van Sant.

Today the warriors will be reviewed by Capt. Van Deman, of the 21st regulars, stationed at Fort Snelling, after which, guns, belts, and other war paraphernalia will be turned in preparatory to the general camp-breaking of the institution.

Corporal Blair Wins.

As a result of the competitive examination for the Guild Medal it is announced that Corporal D. S. Blair is first, with a percentage of 86; Sergeant R. M. West being a close second. This contest was open only to non-commissioned officers. Several fine stunts were done by the privates, one of them receiving a grade of 94.

Promotions Announced Later.

Major Morgan finds it impractical to publish a complete list of the cadet officers for the next year at this time, but the list when completed will be published in the daily papers.

As it is probable that the ability of some cadet may be overlooked, it is requested that in case a student decides finally not to take drill as an option, he will notify by letter, the commandant at as early a date as possible, and an examination for promotion will be held early in September for the purpose of filling vacancies.

The academics will drill next semester at 4 o'clock p. m., but it is uncertain as yet when the engineers will line up. It is possible that there may be two different drill hours, one for each battalion.

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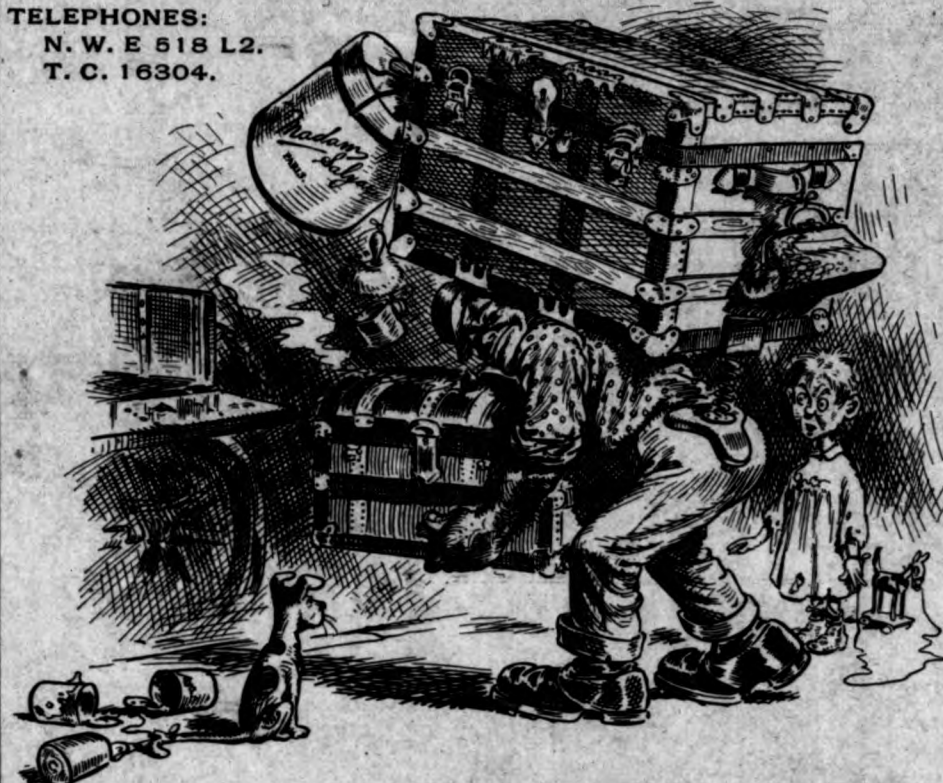
