BOOK REVIEW HOUR WEDNESDAY

The next book review hour will concern itself with one of the important dramatic works of recent issue. Professor Thomas Job will review "The Rumor," by C. K. Munro. The play has been classed as a "vast" work, so large in conception that it has not been given public performance. It is satirical, dealing, among other things, with the peace negotiations of 1918, and has many original qualities. Professor Job is a friend of the author and hence feels an intimate appreciation of the play.

CONVOCAATION ADDRESS BY T. Y. WANG

The convocation address on Thursday will be given by Mr. T. Y. Wang, on the topic, "The Chinese Youth Movement." Many interesting and important things are happening in China these days, of some of which we have only garbled notions. It is well to have the reports come from an authentic source. Mr. Wang is a specially appointed representative of the Manchurian Bureau of Education, primarily for the study of American education. He therefore speaks quite officially in his explanation of the educational and political movements in China.

RARIG TO PRESENT AMERICAN POETRY

Professor Frank M. Rarig, chairman of the department of Public Speaking, will give a lecture-recital on "Present-Day American Poets," Thursday afternoon at 4:30 in the Music Auditorium. A large portion of the hour will be given to readings of representative examples of recent poems, and the balance to the discussion of certain outstanding poets and their work. Poetry is assuming a large place in American literature, and its discussion should interest a large group of summer students.

LECTURE ON CLEANING AND DYEING

Students of chemistry and of home economics in particular will be interested in the lecture to be given Wednesday, July 14, at 3:30 p.m., in the Chemistry Auditorium, by Mr. C. C. Hubbard, on "New Discoveries in Fabrics, Dyes, and Solvents." Mr. Hubbard is Research Associate of the National Dyers' and Cleaners' Association, and has conducted considerable investigation in the National Bureau of Standards. His talk will deal with the latest findings in this industry.

CHARTERED BOAT TRIP ON MINNETONKA

On Saturday there will be opportunity for 125 to enjoy a two-hour ride covering practically the whole length of Lake Minnetonka. A boat has been chartered, to leave the Excelsior wharf at 4 o'clock, for the exclusive use of our party. Tickets for the boat are now on sale at the Bursar's office, at 25 cents each.

The trip to Excelsior may be made on the trolley, leaving from the station, 17 North Sixth street. The last car to connect with the boat leaves at 3:10 p.m. The boat will return to Excelsior at 6 o'clock.
