## WILL VOTE TODAY ON AMENDMENTS

### STUDENTS CONSIDER PROPOSED ADDITIONS

All arrangements made for voting.—Everyone May Become Member of Association—Departments to Vote Separately.

At the polls today there will be an opportunity for all members, and those who wish to be members, of the Athletic Association to vote upon the proposed amendments to its constitution. Any man may become a member of the Athletic Association by signing the constitution and an opportunity will be given any who wish to sign at the polls.

For convenience it has been arranged that the departments vote separately. The Academics may cast their votes in the Registrar's office from ten a. m. to 3 p. m.

Polls for the Medics will be located in the Histology building and will be open from 10 a. m. until 3 p. m. The Dents and Pharmacists will also cast their votes in the Histology building between these same hours.

Arrangements have been made for the Laws to vote in their own building. The polls will be open from 10 a. m. to 1 p. m. for the Day Laws and from 1 p. m. to 9 p. m. for the Night Laws.

The officers of the Association hope that the student body will avail themselves of the opportunity to vote upon these amendments and so show their interest in athletics. They were first suggested by the student mass meeting some weeks ago and were drawn up after mature and careful consideration.

## ATHLETIC GIRLS TO PLAY TENNIS

### GIRLS' TENNIS COURT IS NOW READY.

Rules made to Facilitate Playing, and Give Every One a Chance to Play. Any Girl May Join Club.

Girls' tennis is now on in full swing and hereafter all girls with athletic tastes will spend their off hours in the section of the campus beyond the law building.

The court has been put in the best of order and a net and balls secured. The net will be put up every morning and taken down at night, so that players will not have to see to this matter at all. The balls will be left in the Y. W. C. A. room where they can be had by members of the club who do not wish to provide their own.

To keep the balls from being lost the following course has been adopted. A list containing the names of all paid members of the club has been put up in the Y. W. C. A. room. When a member takes the club balls she shall put down her name, the date of taking, and when the ball are brought back, she shall cross out the date before set down. This rule will be insisted upon and the girls are requested

## RIVAL GLASSES ENGAGE IN FRAY

### LONG BREWING TROUBLE FINDS OUTLET.

Brave Freshmen Raise Banner at Midnight, but Wakeful Sophs Outwit Them—Boxing and Wrestling Matches Galore.

Yesterday, at Chapel hour, came the much expected class scrap.

It was rather tame, on the whole, and was stopped by a strike before it had begun.

Last night at about 10 o'clock the Freshmen organized a "bunch," secured paint, and replaced the '08 numerals with their own. They also suspended their banner on the telephone wires in front of the Physics Building and by midnight were home slumbering soundly, dreaming of victorious scraps and humiliated Sophs.

In the morning, however, when they entered the campus they were again greeted with the '08 numerals and in the place of their banner hung the banner of their rivals.

Consternation reigned and a scrap was planned, so when the Sophomores waved their banner, which had been cut down, the battle was on. A general rough-house continued for a quarter of an hour, during which a window in the Physics Building was smashed, and that building decorated with '08 and '09 numerals.

A circle was then formed and boxing and wrestling were in order. Peterson, '08, won the first fall from Bacus, '09, in a wrestling match on a full Nelson. No Sophomore could be found to box with Pettijohn, '09. Pardee, '06, and Gage, '09, were very closely matched as wrestlers, and were hitting up a royal fight when Prexie entered the ring.

He said he had no objection to the contests that were taking place, but did not want to see public property destroyed or disfigured, as if had been during the last few days.

He then reminded the crowd that it was just time for the 4th hour and requested that they disperse, which they quietly did.

## COUNCIL SETTLES MANY QUESTIONS

### COACH WILLIAMS' SALARY FIXED AT \$3000.

New Committee on Athletics Appointed, and Also New Committee to Have Charge of Library, Other Matters Considered.

Dr. Williams' salary as football and track coach was fixed at \$3000 by the University Council at its meeting yesterday.

This matter has been the subject of a good deal of agitation among both students and faculty. At the last football conference a resolution was adopted for the purpose of preventing football coaches from receiving higher salaries than those of paid professors.

In accordance with this resolution the Council cut Dr. Williams' salary down to \$2500. He was just completing the contract under which he received \$3000 and was about to enter upon a new three years' contract providing for a \$3500 salary.

The students in their mass meeting several weeks ago objected to this cut in Dr. Williams' salary, and urged strongly the matter was allowed to rest until Dr. Williams himself asked for definite action on the part of the faculty.

A new committee on athletics was appointed. The majority of the men previously appointed objected to serving, and the new committee was appointed, consisting of Professors West, Faise, Brooke, Harding and Dr. Westbrook. The first three were present at the council meeting, and this is taken to mean that they will serve. Professor Harding is himself a former

## MINNESOTA WINS FROM CARLETON

### ONE SIDED GAME GIVES SCORE OF 22 TO 1.

Little Team Play Shown—12 Hits Together With Errors, Left Minnesota a Total of 22—Many Changes in Lineup During Game.

Minnesota Defeated Carleton yesterday by the score of 22 to 1. The game was too one sided to be of much interest, and both play was not in evidence. However, this can only be gained with more playing.

Minnesota scored at will, and took advantage of every error made by the visitors. Errors coupled with twelve hits gave Minnesota a total of 22, while Carleton secured but one hit.

Carleton's only run came in the seventh inning. Three men were on bases when a high fly went out to center. Pidgeon made a long run but dropped the ball and one run resulted for the Congregationalists. Pidgeon's quick return of the ball, however, caught a man off 1st base.

Among the Gophers, Hurley's fielding was especially noticeable. He made several pretty catches of flies and fouls along the right foul line.

Several changes were made in the Varsity lineup during the game. Robertson went in at 2nd base in place of Spooner in the fourth inning.

Volstead started the game for Minnesota but was replaced by McGroarty who gave way to Christenson in the ninth. Tyler went in at 1st base for Marshall in the 8th.

Grove pitched six innings for Carleton but gave way to Washburn.

When they reported in the afternoon, they were informed that the three exams, in survey, metallurgy and mining, respectively, would be postponed until the regular week for finals in June.

The Miners are objecting strenuously, claiming that the penalty is too severe for the offense as many have made arrangements for summer work early in June. It is understood that a protest will be lodged in an endeavor to have the exams brought on at an earlier date.

The amendments to be submitted are as follows:

Art. XI. Sec. I. Constitution. Amended to read as follows: This constitution and the by-laws adopted under it may be amended at any meeting of the association by a two-thirds vote provided that notice be given of the amendment in the official organ of the association one week prior thereto.

**By-laws.**  
1. The board shall make no contract of employment with any coach or manager for a longer duration of time than two years.

2. No officer of the association and no student participating in athletics under the control of the association shall be granted any employment or be granted any privilege involving a pecuniary consideration.

3. The board shall sign no contract for the employment of any coach, manager or other employee the amount of whose compensation exceeds 500 per season, until the terms of such contract have been made public one week.

4. The president shall, upon the petition of twenty-five members, call a meeting of the association.

5. All expenditures warranted, and all bills approved by the board at any meeting, shall be published within three days after such meeting.

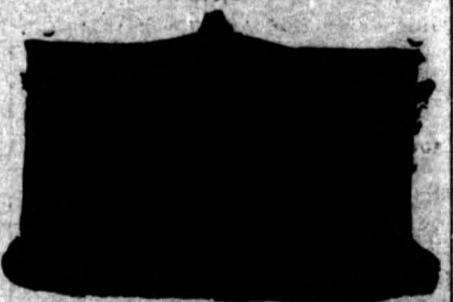
