



ECONOMIC CONDITIONS

Economic activity in June edged upward at a slightly lesser pace than average for the May-June period. The Duluth Business Index (DBI) in June was 138, up by one point over May but eight points over June of last year. During the past 10 years the DBI has recorded an average gain of two points in the May-June comparison.

Wage and salary employment in June was 44,400 which represents a gain of 550 workers over May. June job gains were in the nonmanufacturing sector paced by added hiring in construction and retail trade. Employment gains over one year ago were due chiefly to increased hiring in construction and service establishments. Manufacturing firms added about 100 jobs over and above one year ago. One partially offsetting change was in government work where agency employment was down about 365 workers from one year ago chiefly in local government jobs.

For the first one-half of this year the monthly number of jobs has averaged 42,875, or 1.3 percent above the same six-month period of 1986. A heavy contributor to the better job picture this year has been the increase in jobs in the construction industry.

The average weekly wage for production workers in manufacturing workers in June was \$417.91 for a 39.5 hour workweek which includes 2.6 overtime hours worked. One month earlier the average weekly wage was \$393.57 for 38.1 hour workweek which included 2.1 overtime hours.

Unemployment in June was 9.7 percent of the labor force

which was up from the 8.4 percent in May. Historically, the jobless rate for June increases over May due to the influx of new entrants and re-entrants into the labor market as schools close for the summer and undergraduates seek summer jobs. In addition, graduates and teachers add to the supply of workers seeking jobs.

Among the unemployed workers who are also collecting unemployment insurance benefits there has been an increase in the number of job seekers in the 25-44 year old bracket. In June of this year 62 percent of the workers collecting unemployment benefits were in this age bracket compared to 57.8 percent in June of last year. In the 55 year and older age bracket the relative share declined from 30.1 percent in June of 1986 to 28.8 percent this June.

The index of the value of building permits issued and under construction (in 1967 dollars) in June recorded an increase over May but the month-to-month change was less than the average May to June seasonal increase of the past 10 years. Seasonal patterns of past years have not been followed this year due to the number of large single permits issued involving construction over many months. This situation has tended to alter the monthly seasonal pattern established in past years.

Since the first of the year a total of \$27.1 million in building permits have been issued compared to \$12.3 million issued for the same six months of 1986. The biggest gain has occurred in the area of nonresidential construction. For the

first half of this year about 44 percent of the building construction dollar has gone for nonresidential construction compared to 11.7 percent last year. Although more money this year has gone for alteration and repair work than last year, its share of the building construction dollar fell to 41 percent this year compared to 75 percent in 1986.

Construction of new single residential dwellings has risen dramatically this year. Since January, a total of 35 such permits have been issued for a total valuation of \$2,136,912 compared to 13 permits for a total valuation of \$813,577 for the same six months of last year. The average size of the permit valuations this year was \$61,056, down slightly from the \$62,583 figure noted in 1986.

The use of electric power by commercial and industrial customers dropped two points from May. In recent years this component experienced an increase of less than one index point. Less electric power consumption in commercial businesses was only partially offset by scattered gains in the industrial sector.

Compared to one year earlier the use of electric power by commercial and industrial customers was up significantly. Increased consumption by educational institutions and health facilities was noted in the over-the-year comparison in the commercial sector. Industrial customers, as a group, used about 5 percent more power than last June with the paper mill pacing the increase.

Grain receipts and shipments picked up seasonally in June over May although the upward surge still did not result in the season-to-date volume handled matching last year's figure. So far this year the volume of grain handled lags last year by 3 percent.

Iron ore shipments this year are projected to better the 1986 tonnage figure as the market firmed up somewhat. In recent years the shipment of iron ore has recorded a noticeable gain between May and June; however, this trend did not occur this year and the June ore shipment figure was below that of one year earlier. For the year-to-date, iron ore shipments are up 5 percent over 1986.

Import-export cargo (other than grain) declined in June from May which has been the pattern in recent years for this period. June's tonnage figure was also below that of one year ago. So far this season waterborne tonnage is down 24 percent from last year's tonnage figure for the same period of time. Overseas general cargo imports this year are running below last year and overseas exports of general cargo and oilseeds are well below the 1986 season-to-date tonnage. Imports of Canadian dry bulk and Canadian exports of coal and coke are also below the first half record of last year.


Retail sales, deflated for price increases, recorded a drop in the May-June comparison. In the previous two years a similar pattern also existed. The increased pace of consumer spending this year is evident by the June gain of 2.2 percent over the same month of last year and also by the statistics which show that for the first six months of this year sales have averaged 4.9 percent over the corresponding months of 1986.

In June of 1986 department stores, grocery stores and motor vehicle dealers of both new and used cars and service stations accounted for 57.6 percent of the retail dollar, but this year these same components made up 51.9 of the retail sales dollar.

Metal mining employment increased by 700 in the May-June comparison. Some callbacks of laid off workers occurred as the steel industry showed some sign of firming up. The 4,700 workers in the mines in June, however, still was well below the 6,000-worker level of June 1986.

Unemployment in the seven counties of Northeastern Minnesota in June was 9.5 percent, up from the 8.4 percent

level of May and was also up by one percentage point over June of 1986. The jobless rates for both Duluth and N.E. Minnesota were well above the rate for Minnesota which was 4.8 percent in June and 4.4 percent in May.
