The recent destruction of the normal school at Mankato by fire emphasizes the danger of university buildings being destroyed by fire. Our danger is greatly accentuated by reason of the fact that students and faculty, in violation of the rules of the state fire marshal, smoke within the buildings. There is no building in which the danger is greater than the Mechanic Arts Building, particularly in the post office of that building, yet this is the place where the rules of the state fire marshal are most flagrantly violated. It is to be hoped that the students and faculty will take this matter in hand and see that the danger is reduced to the lowest possible minimum.
