

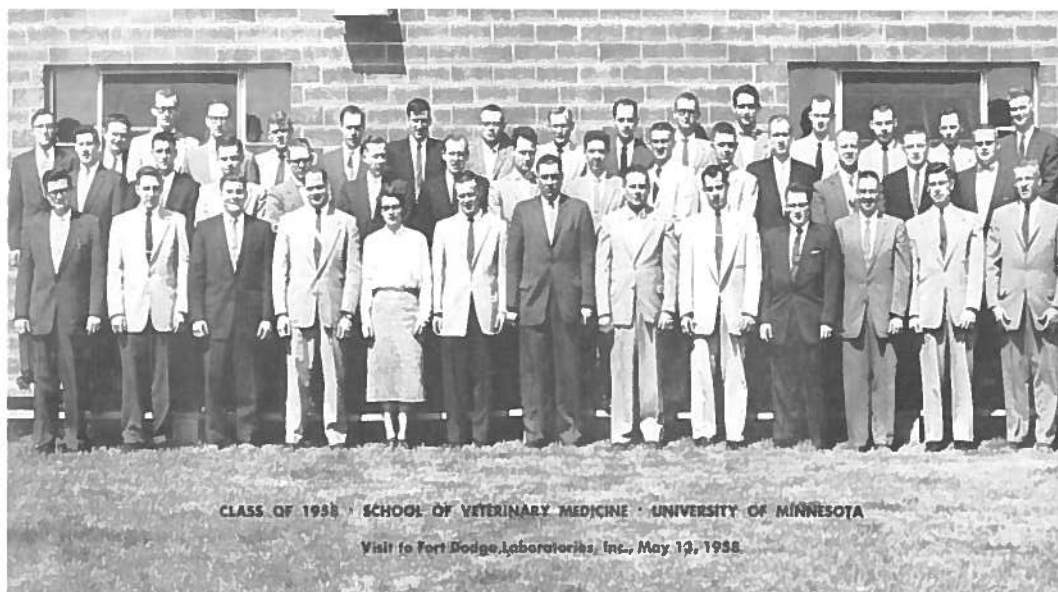

ACTIVITIES SINCE GRADUATION:

From 1958 to 1960, I was on active duty in the U.S. Army. I retired as colonel in the U.S. Army Reserve in 1990. From 1960 to 1965, I was an instructor in the Department of Veterinary Microbiology, Pathology, and Public Health at Purdue University. In 1962, I achieved my M.S. in veterinary parasitology at Purdue University. In 1965 I was awarded my Ph.D. in experimental pathology from Purdue. From 1965 to 1998, I was associate professor and professor in the Department of Veterinary Pathology, University of Missouri. I am currently professor emeritus. In 1976, I taught classes on swine diseases in Poland and won an award from the Polish Academy of Sciences. In 1978 I taught on poultry diseases in Syria on a Fulbright short-term award. I have authored or coauthored over 130 research publications in refereed journals, mainly on fowl cholera in turkeys and streptococci infections, transmissible gastroenteritis, salmonella, and dysentery in swine. In 1979 I studied salmonella control in Scandinavia on a World Health Organization Award. In 1989 and 1990 I was on a Fulbright Senior Lectureship in Zimbabwe, teaching veterinary pathology and microbiology and swine and poultry diseases. In 1998 and 1999 I won a Fulbright Senior Lectureship in Ukraine teaching the same as above. Over the years, I have consulted or advised on livestock disease problems in more than 15 countries. In 1995, I received a Pfizer Excellence in Poultry Research Award from American Veterinary Medical Association. In 1996, I received the American Feed Industry Award for outstanding research in diseases affecting livestock and poultry production from the American Veterinary Medical Association.

CURRENT ACTIVITIES: Since 1998, I have participated in an International Seminar at the University of Missouri devoted solely to world problems. After having visited a fair portion of the planet, the one discipline I wanted to focus on was geopolitics. I remember attending a lecture on world population at the University of Minnesota in the early 1950s, when the earth was estimated to have a little over two billion people, and authorities were concerned.
