## BASKET TOSSERS MAKE AN AUSPICIOUS DEBUT

Wealth of Material Shows up For First Practice—New Rule are Tried.

Last night Cooke's ramblers made their initial appearance on the Armory floor, and although they played to an empty balcony, the session was strenuous and edifying to the participants. More than thirty-five aspirants showed up for this first practice, and competition for place promises to be keen. The workout only lasted about an hour, and in view of the fact that the squad hasn't any wind as yet, the men were changed frequently, so that everyone was given a chance to show what he could do.

The usual bunch of old-timers and ineligible were perched along the business edge of the stage, and cheered the players on with words of admonition and loving kindness. Deering, Mencke and Rosenwald were among those who decorated the side-lines. "Rosy" is still resting from his football labors but will be out with the basket ball men in a few days.

The revised rules made their debut, with "Doc" as the "angel," and altho some of the chronic "rough-housers" chafed at having new restrictions placed upon them, the majority voted them an unqualified success. Play under these rules is just as fast, and many former objectionable features have been eliminated.

Some of last year's ineligible have succeeded in again entering the purity fold, and their appearance brought joy to the heart of the coach. Among these were Kaiser, a fast and clever guard, McElmeel, who played with Co. B, last season, Dart Lyford, and Bill Clark. Brodle is a new man who shows plenty of class and will make the "sure-thingers" hustle.

With the best lot of eligible material which he has had in years to develop a winning "quint" from, Dr. Cooke is optimistic over the prospects for the season. He is sure that the five best men picked from such a large number of candidates will be able to make a good record.

## ATHLETES TO BE COACHED FOR FINAL EXAMINATIONS

Representatives from Various Senior Classes Will Look After Scholarship of Football Men.

Before the end of the week a committee composed of members of the different senior classes will be appointed to take charge of the movement to aid men who are engaged in athletics in their studies.

Edward Coughlan, president of the Athletic Board of Control, following the plan outlined by E. B. Pierce, has asked each of the presidents of the senior classes to confer with the deans of their respective schools and pick out a representative from each senior class. These representatives are to be supplied with the class records of the various football, track or basketball men in their colleges. If any of these men are below in their work, it will be up to the representatives to get some one to help them.

"We expect to have this plan in operation before the end of this semester," says Registrar Pierce, "so that football men may get the advantage of such assistance in their final examinations. In the future we hope to enlarge the scope of the movement."

## EAST THIRTY-SIX YEARS BEHIND US IN ORATORY

So Declares Professor Trueblood of Michigan, Who L lectured on "Public Speaking."

Professor Trueblood, head of the department of oratory at Michigan said yesterday in an address on "Public Speaking," that in touring the country he found the East to be fully thirty-six years behind the West in the organization of oratorical contests.

Professor Trueblood advocated participation in oratorical contests and recommended the study of the methods of orators, both those before the public today and the speakers who thrilled our ancestors.

A brilliant future was predicted for Delta Sigma Rho, which Prof. Trueblood asserted was actually founded at Minnesota.

An audience which crowded to the doors the large lecture room on the third floor of Folwell showed its appreciation by close attention and frequent applause.

### MINE CATASTROPHES SUBJECT OF INVESTIGATION

Alumnus of Minnesota Starts Experiments to Determine Conditions Leading to Explosions.

Some interesting experiments to determine the conditions necessary for explosions in coal mines are soon to be commenced in the Mining Laboratories by Mr. J. A. Grant, a graduate of the University of Minnesota. Mr. Grant came from the mines at Sand Coulee, Mont., where he has been located for the past two years.

In spite of the frequency with which disastrous explosions occur in coal mines, very little is known in regard to actual conditions leading up to such catastrophes. Mr. Grant has been forcibly impressed by the need of such knowledge, and feels that a year or so can be very profitably spent in investigation.

Mr. Grant will compute from the data obtained, the percentages of volatile matter and fixed carbon, as well as several gases, such as carbon monoxide, methane, etc., which are present when explosion or firing takes place. Finally, the percentage of moisture and slate dust, which is not inflammable, necessary to render the above determined dangerous mixture "dead" or harmless, may be ascertained.

As a result of his investigations, Mr. Grant hopes to obtain sufficient data to enable him to institute methods for the prevention of disastrous explosions in the coal mines of the country.

### NAT'L CONVENTION OF MEDIC SORORITY HELD

Delegates from Eleven Colleges Entertained by Local Chapter of Alpha Epsilon Iota.

Alpha Epsilon Iota, the Medical sorority, held its national convention in Minneapolis Friday and Saturday. The sorority is composed of eleven chapters, and this is the first time that Minnesota's chapter has entertained the convention.

The thirty visiting delegates were extensively entertained by the local active and associate members.

Luncheon was served Friday by Mrs. Westbrook and Mrs. Frankforter. Entertainment was held at 6:30, followed by a banquet at the Plaza. A reception was given out Saturday afternoon at the home of Mrs. Westbrook.

Alpha Epsilon Iota was established at Minnesota about eight years ago.

At present there are nine active members, and six associate members, consisting of wives of the medical faculty. At the convention four sophomore girls were initiated; Misses Kline, Nye, Coffin and Brown.

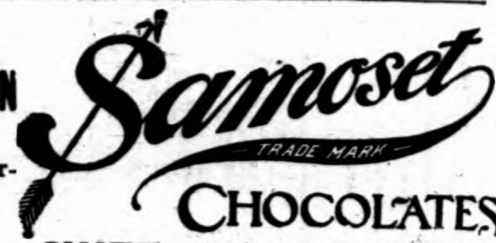
Dr. Eleanor J. Hill, a graduate member of the Minnesota chapter was elected national president.

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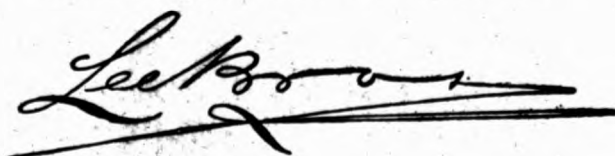
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
