NOTICE TO THE STAFF

The rules governing expense accounts, established by the State Auditor of Minnesota and reported under date of January 18, 1923, are as follows:

1. The reason for each trip out of the ordinary department duties must be stated on the expense voucher.
2. Receipts must be obtained and furnished for all
 - a. Railroad transportation.
 - b. Sleeping car fares.
 - c. Bus or automobile fares between towns.
 - d. Hotel accommodations (except single meals).
3. Receipts are not required for single meals.
4. Two dollars (\$2.00) is the limit allowed for a single meal.
5. Receipts must be furnished for all other items of expense of \$1.00 or more.
6. Include bus fares and boat hire under "livery" head in your expense account—with notations.
7. File expense accounts for each calendar month as soon after the close of the month as possible. They will be paid the 15th of the following month, if audited in time.
8. Foot up each column in your account as well as the total amount.
9. Exercise care in making out your accounts to avoid delay. If they are incorrect or incomplete, they must be returned for corrections.

Please note that under item 4, \$2.00 is the limit allowed for a single meal, whether receipt is obtained or not.
