SECOND TERM DRAMATICS

The dramatic performances of the second term will begin with a performance on Tuesday night of Charles Klein's comedy, "Maggie Pepper." Klein is well known as the author of "The Lion and the Mouse," "Within the Law," and other successful plays. "Maggie Pepper" has had much success throughout the country since its original New York production, five or six years ago.

The cast of twelve, selected from professional students, is directed by John Todd, leading character actor of the Bainbridge Players, of the Schubert Theater in Minneapolis. The performance is expected to be on a par with other summer productions. There are no reserved seats for the performance; general admission to the public will be 50 cents, and the regular reduced rate of 25 cents for members of the Summer Session will apply, when Members' tickets are presented. The box office in Music Hall will be open on Monday and Tuesday afternoons for the sale of tickets. The capacity of the auditorium is about 550. Buy early and attend early.

SCHEERER RECITALS CONTINUED

The dramatic recitals by Maud Scheerer, which have delighted such large audiences during the latter weeks of the first term will be continued during the first weeks of the second term. The first presentation will be of "Volpone," which was postponed from the first term. This is a new adaptation of a play by Ben Johnson and has been one of the conspicuous successes of the past year's New York season. Practically all the plays given by Miss Scheerer are taken from the current New York repertory, and offer a splendid opportunity for members of the Summer Session to secure a form of contact with the newer plays.

SUMMER SESSION MEMBERS' TICKETS

A few of the events of the summer program are restricted to members of the Summer Session; and in the case of dramatic offerings a special price of admission is made to members. The certificate of membership is a ticket issued to all who pay Summer Session fees. These tickets may now be had at the office of the Director of the Summer Session, 235 Administration Building.

Restricted events are so indicated in the Daily Bulletin and provided with a number. All other events are open to the public.

GRADES FOR THE FIRST TERM OF THE SUMMER SESSION

The grade reports for the first term of the Summer Session will be mailed out by the Registrar's office on or about August 11, 1928. They will be sent to the home addresses of the students, as given on the registration blanks. Students who will not be at these addresses are requested to call at the General Information window of the Registrar's office to fill out a change of address slip:

ALL STUDENTS WHO WILL ATTEND THE SECOND TERM OF THE SUMMER SESSION, AND WHO WISH TO HAVE THEIR FIRST TERM'S REPORTS SENT TO THEIR MINNEAPOLIS OR ST. PAUL ADDRESSES, ARE REQUESTED TO TURN IN, AT GENERAL INFORMATION WINDOW OF THE REGISTRAR'S OFFICE, A SELF ADDRESSED AND STAMPED ENVELOPE. This should be done not later than Monday, July 30, 1928.

Students who wish to have transcripts of their Summer Session work sent to the State Department of Education, other institutions, etc., should call at the Information window at the Registrar's office, in order that they may fill out a transcript request blank.

THE RECREATIONAL PROGRAM

The program of extra-curricular activities is provided for Summer Session students in the interests of a balanced ration of work and play. It replaces those activities which during other quarters of the year are under the auspices of student organizations which do not function during the summer. An attempt is made to make the program as varied as possible. Physical exercise is given a large place, and as will be seen in another column there is ample provision for the exercise of every muscle on the campus. Literary and artistic impulses, and still more academic interests are cared for by a series of lectures and convocation addresses and by concerts and recitals. The social side is provided for in a series of Saturday evening parties, while the excursions furnish an admirable opportunity to become acquainted with interesting features of Twin City life.

The entire program is maintained by and for students. All should feel that it is theirs to enjoy. The Summer Session office will welcome all suggestions for the improvement of the program or for the introduction of events not now planned.

EXCURSIONS

The administration has arranged for two or three trips each week of the Summer Session to points of interest in and around the Twin Cities. This will give students opportunity for that education which may be secured through personal contact with the civic, social, and cultural institutions beyond our University campus.

Plans so far made have not exhausted the possibilities in the way of destinations for these organized visits; members of the Summer Session who have any desires in the way of places of interest should submit their suggestions to the Summer Session Office, 235 Administration Building.

There will be an opportunity on Wednesday afternoon, August 1st, to inspect one of the large and interesting industrial plants of the Northwest, that of the makers of "Sunshine" biscuits.

The Loose-Wiles Candy and Biscuit Company is the largest in the northwest. It employs 700 people. Students making this trip will see the manufacture of all kinds of crackers, cookies, hard sweets, marshmallows, and chocolate creams.

ATHLETIC RECREATION

Athletic activities on the recreation program for the Summer Session students will include golf, tennis, baseball, playground ball, volley ball, handball, horseshoes, squash and swimming. Playing space and equipment except racquets, clubs and balls for tennis and golf, are provided and the whole program is supervised and directed as needed.

Golf

The University Recreation Field golf course is open to all members of the summer session, students or faculty, if they secure a permit card from Room 110 University Armory. The club house is located on Cleveland Avenue, St. Paul, six-tenths of a mile north of the Agricultural College buildings. There is a stop at Cleveland Avenue on the inter-campus car line for those who wish to use that line in reaching the course. The grounds fee is 35 cents (nine holes); coupon books good for ten rounds are sold for \$3.00.

Tennis

The University tennis courts on Washington Avenue are open to students of the Summer Session on presentation of tennis privilege cards. These cards are issued free of charge to students presenting bursar's fee receipts at Room 110 University Armory. During registration days these cards will be issued in the lobby of the Registrar's office.) These courts are provided with nets and kept in perfect condition by daily attention, and are considered the finest courts in the Twin Cities.

Members of the faculty and non-students may procure tennis cards for a fee of \$1.00 per summer term at the University Tennis courts.

Ball

For those desiring to organize teams in the various games of ball a schedule of games will be organized, to run throughout the Summer Session. Groups should communicate with the Intramural Athletics office, which will handle the schedule.

Tournaments

Tournaments in tennis singles and doubles, golf, horseshoes, volley ball, and playground ball are being arranged. Posted on the athletic bulletin board in the University Post Office is a large registration card for those who wish to enter the individual tournaments. Registrations close Wednesday, August 1st. Gold and silver medals are awarded to the winner and the runner up.
