Voted to approve cooperative plan with the United States Engineers Office, St. Paul, Minnesota, for the investigation of certain problems in hydraulics relating to earth dams, in accordance with memorandum of agreement filed supplement to the minutes, page 923.

The President of the University presented "The President's Report for the biennium ending June 30, 1932."

Voted to approve the following modification of fees for the parental education courses in the Institute of Child Welfare effective July 1, 1933, originally approved by the Board of Regents on June 28, 1932 and amended October 29, 1932:

1. For study group work in which the group undertakes the responsibility for the organization and maintenance of the group and the fee is paid in a lump sum by the group; a fee of \$30 for a unit course of six lessons.
2. When more than six lessons are desired, additional lessons are to be included in the original fee on a pro rata basis.
3. For reading courses without credit where such course materials are distributed by the leader of the group in bulk at the outset and without the privilege of correction or return of answers, a fee of 50 cents per course of 16 lessons. This covers both the reading course on Child Care and Training and on Later Childhood and Adolescence, and any additional similar courses that are developed.
4. For reading courses without credit where course material is distributed by mail and the student has the privilege of having answers corrected and of receiving a certificate, a fee of \$1 per course.

The Comptroller of the University reported a fire in the Girls' Cooperative Cottage No. 1, located at 1800 University Avenue S.E., estimated loss of \$306 covered by insurance.

Voted to approve the following resolution regarding the Summerfield Lease:

WHEREAS the parties managing the property adjacent to the State Capitol in St. Paul under lease have made a default in the payment of the rent therein reserved which default is serious and admittedly beyond the power of the Lessee to pay and he is desirous of being relieved of any further burden under the lease,

NOW, THEREFORE, be it resolved that we proceed to cancel the lease on Lots 11 and 48, Auditor's Sub-division No. 10, St. Paul. And that for and in consideration of such cancellation the Lessee agrees to convey to the University in fee simple and absolute, free and clear of all incumbrances a lot on Summit Avenue, St. Paul, between Saratoga and Pascal Avenues. That when such conveyance is made to the University the Lessee therein be relieved of any and all further liability for payments under the lease.

The President of the University presented a communication from the Daughters of the American Revolution, relative to military training, which was read, ordered acknowledged, and filed supplement to the minutes, page 924.

Voted to approve Library membership in the Association of Research Libraries at an annual cost of \$5.

Voted to approve the following credit hour fees in Pharmacy for academic courses beginning with the fall quarter 1933-34:

\$3 per credit hour for residents of Minnesota, and
\$4 per credit hour for non-residents

Voted to authorize application to the Federal Radio Commission for the time used and now being given up by KFMX, Carleton College, Northfield, Minnesota.

Voted to approve the following resolution:

WHEREAS the several corporations managing the property at Sixth and Hennepin as Lessees and their assigns have made default in the payment of the rent therein reserved and in the payment of taxes and assessments which default is serious and admittedly beyond their present power of payment.

NOW, THEREFORE, be it resolved that we proceed to cancel the lease on Lot 7, Block 222, Hoag and Bell's Addition to Minneapolis by giving notice of default as provided in the lease or otherwise and that the University declare the term ended and re-enter the premises and manage the same for the benefit of the trust.

Voted to authorize acceptance in lieu of the \$5,000 of South Carolina Highway notes due February 15, 1933, payment of \$1,000 in cash and \$4,000 in one-year 6% notes of the denomination of \$1,000.
