STUDENTS' HEALTH SERVICE

Notice to Students from Duluth and Range Towns

A virulent form of smallpox has broken out in Duluth. This is not the mild type of the disease with which we have become familiar in recent years. It is the so-called hemorrhagic or "black" smallpox carrying a mortality rate from 25 to 33 per cent which has caused so many deaths recently in Kansas City, Denver and other cities. There have been twelve deaths in Duluth to date, and there is reason to believe that the epidemic is not yet under control and may spread to the Range and the Twin Cities.

All students contemplating spending Easter vacation in or near Duluth are strongly advised to be vaccinated before leaving. This applies to any person who has not had a successful vaccination within the past 4 or 5 years.

Health Service records show that there are approximately 100 students living in or near Duluth who are not protected against smallpox by a recent vaccination.

In spite of any and all arguments to the contrary, there is overwhelming scientific evidence to prove the following points:

1. Vaccination is an absolute preventive of smallpox.
2. Vaccination is in no way dangerous. Of the 3,000 students already vaccinated at the university this year, the amount of school time lost due to vaccinations was negligible.

Vaccination may be obtained free of charge at the Health Service at any hour of the day.

WINTER QUARTER REPORTS TO STUDENTS

WINTER QUARTER FINAL REPORTS

All members of the teaching staff are reminded that under the regulation of the University Senate, final reports for the winter quarter are due in the Registrar's office not later than 12 o'clock noon, March 25. The Registrar's office is planning to make every effort to have all final grades or the winter quarter recorded and forwarded to students before the spring quarter opens and without interfering with the spring quarter registration procedure. This will make it possible to give complete and accurate information to such faculty committee, advisers, and administrative officers as request such information. It will be possible to do this only if instructors with examinations on Tuesday and Wednesday, March 18 and 19, will file their reports before the 25th. It is requested that reports on such classes be submitted by March 22 or earlier if possible.

The co-operation of each member of the teaching staff is solicited.

SPRING QUARTER FEES

1. Statements covering spring quarter fees have been mailed to all students now registered at the University. March 24 is the last date of payment without penalty. Payments received after that date must bear a postmark date prior to 12 o'clock midnight March 24 to avoid penalty. The penalty or late payment is \$2.00 to April 2, and then increases at the rate of \$1.00 per day. Students who must write home for money or make loans are

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especially urged to complete such arrangements within the time limit in order to avoid penalties.

2. All checks, drafts and money orders should be made payable to The University of Minnesota, and should be accompanied by all three sections of the fee statement. In remitting by mail, the Bursar's envelope received with the fee statement should be used.

3. Fee statements were written on the basis of the records as they appeared in the Registrar's office March 1. Any contemplated modification of these records by petition or otherwise, cannot modify the amount of the fee statement until evidence or authorization is received by the Registrar. Students should, therefore, see that petitions allowing them to defer drill, physical education, etc., or waiving these or other requirements or permitting substitutions or affecting residence are filed with the Registrar before March 24. If this is not done, amount of the fee statement should be paid to avoid penalty and a proper adjustment of fees will be made when the approved petitions are filed. The Bursar will not accept payments on fee statements showing alterations.

4. Remittance must be for the exact amount of the fee statement. The Bursar cannot accept checks, drafts or money orders for an amount in excess of the fee statement. Insufficient remittances will be returned to the student at his own risk. The student's registration will remain incomplete until his fees are paid in full.

5. Failure to receive a fee statement cannot be accepted as sufficient reason for late payment or non-payment of fees. Any student who does not receive a fee statement in his University post-office box within a reasonable time may secure a duplicate fee statement at the Registrar's Office. Students whose work takes them from the campus must inform the Registrar's office promptly of change of address.

6. Students using "War Service" tuition, trainees of the U. S. Veterans' Bureau, the State Division of Re-education, Foreign Government students, and beneficiaries of the scholarship funds of miscellaneous war-time agencies, must secure the written approval of the Assistant Registrar on their fee statements and present them to the Bursar within the above mentioned time limit in order to avoid penalty for late payment.
