NOTICE CONCERNING IN ABSENTIA EXAMINATIONS

In those cases where students of the second term of the Summer Session have to leave the campus before the close of the term, in order to report for their next year's teaching positions, provision will be made for them to take their final examinations in absentia. This privilege will be granted only in cases where it is necessary for students to leave because of the above reason. Students desiring to secure this arrangement must follow the procedure listed below.

1. The student must petition to the Students' Work Committee of the college for permission to take examinations in absentia. (Petitions must be made out in duplicate; forms for petitions may be secured at the general information window of the Registrar's office. The petition must name the place to which the examination is to be sent, and some responsible person, preferably an officer of the school system, who will proctor the examination.

2. Before turning in the petition to the Students' Work Committee, the instructor of the course must approve and sign the petition. In case in absentia examinations are desired in more than one course, only one petition is necessary, BUT IT MUST HAVE THE APPROVAL OF EVERY INSTRUCTOR CONCERNED.

3. As soon as this office is notified that the petitions have been approved, the examinations will be sent to the proctors named in the petitions, together with instructions for giving the examinations, and returning the papers.

4. Students will receive the grade of incomplete in those courses in which they are taking their examinations in absentia. These incomplete grades will be removed as soon as the instructor has granted the examinations, and forwarded a report to this office. Students will receive a report of the final grade from the Registrar.
