The fire was extinguished without the aid of the department by means of several pails of water and some strenuous work.

As the watchmen make the rounds from one building to another he will fit each key to the proper keyhole and the time will be registered. There is no possible way of dodging this record keeper.

Two of these devices have been ordered and are expected to arrive any day.

THE FUNCTION COMMITTEE.

To the Editor:
In a recent issue of the Daily an editorial appeared calling loudly for the service of the University "Function" Committee. I am glad to state that the committee is still in existence, doing a flourishing monopolistic business and ready to execute all orders in its line, promptly, cheerfully and economically.

But I take this opportunity of correcting some errors of the editor, enlightening him on the duties of the committee, and placing the blame where it belongs for some of the recent conflicts complained.

I beg leave to inform the editor that the committee does not undertake to regulate events that occur off the campus. If the Woman's League wishes to present an operetta at the Lyceum, or the Dramatic Club desires to stage a play at Faribault, or President Roosevelt plans to give a reception in the Blue Room, the Function Committee does not feel authorized to restrain them. If President Northrop will authorize the committee to stop all meetings that conflict with interesting campus events the committee will be glad to do his bidding hesitating at nothing short of murder or treason.

In the second place the committee will not try to settle difficulties which are not brought to its attention. It thrives on trouble but will not go out of its way to hunt for it. For this reason there have been conflicts between such organizations as the U.

L. A. and the U. C. A. They hold meetings at regular, stated intervals and, perhaps, the officers have not thought it necessary to see the Function Committee. If these organizations wish an open field for their meetings, many of which are excellent and should not suffer competition, they must see the committee. It will dispose of all events within its jurisdiction that are brought to its attention in such a manner as to prevent conflict.

Finally, the superintendent of buildings was directed, last year, not to open any buildings on the campus, for any event, without the sanction of the committee, and if the superintendent is not doing his duty it is not the fault of the committee. Please jump on the superintendent, not on your faithful and long-suffering committee:
