### PEAT CONGRESS TO HEAR PASSER RESEARCH PAPER

A research paper by Dr. Moses Passer, professor of chemistry at UMD, will be presented at the Second International Peat Congress in Leningrad, Russia, August 15-22.

Passer is the principal author of the paper entitled "The Proximate Analysis of Peat". The co-authors are Geralt T. Bratt and James A. Elberling, former UMD students, and E. L. Pirer, Ludwig Hartmann and A. J. Madden, Jr. of the Department of Chemical Engineering on the Minneapolis campus.

All papers at the Congress are presented in both English and German. Also, the Soviets have asked for and received permission to translate Passer's paper into Russian for distribution to their peat scientists.

Passer recently was appointed to the Education Liaison Advisory Panel of the American Chemical Society.

### JAY COOKE PARK CHOSEN FOR ALL-SCHOOL OUTING

The Jay Cooke State Park pavilion area, located approximately five miles from Carlton, has been chosen for the All-School Picnic from 4-7 p.m. Thursday.

However, Wendfeldt reminded students with general parking permits that the reserved and special parking apply just as during the regular academic year.

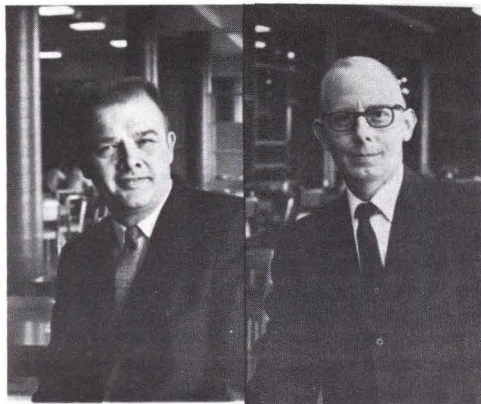

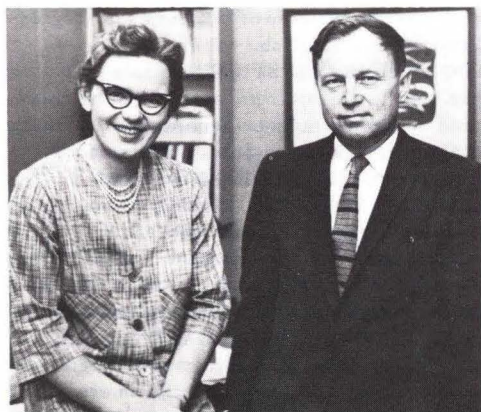
