NOTICE TO INSTRUCTORS AND STUDENTS

Under the regulations of the University Senate, examinations for the removal of conditions will be offered in all colleges during the week preceding the opening of the Fall quarter. Announcements and schedules have been mailed to all departments and to students who are eligible to write the examinations at this time.

The fee for examinations to remove conditions is \$1.00 for each subject. Students who desire to write the examinations should apply at the Registrar's office for fee statements and pay the required fees before the date of the examinations. Instructors will not permit students to take the examinations except upon presentation of the customary receipt showing payment of the fee for the subject in which the examination is to be taken.

The early dates on which these examinations have been announced will make it impossible for the Registrar's office to supply departments with lists of names of students who have paid these fees.

EXEMPTION FROM MILITARY DRILL

Those men students who are physically incapacitated for drill may be excused by reporting to Dr. Brown of the Physical Education Department and having him approve a petition not be left in hands, arranging for such exemption, this petition to be sent to the office of the Dean of Student Affairs for final approval.

For temporary excuses the student should report to the Students' Health Service, receiving from them a memorandum, excusing him. This should be immediately taken to the Military Department where proper record should be made.

Those students who served in the Army during the late war may be relieved from their drill requirements or portion of the same by presenting a petition to the Office of the Dean of Student Affairs, accompanied by their discharge papers.

Students coming from any accredited military school may receive full credit for work done there.

Students coming from any college where the War Department maintains a regular official in charge of the Military Department may receive equivalent credit.

Students coming from a high school in which a military drill is given under the authority of the War Department, may receive equivalent credit.

Student coming from other colleges where military drill is not required may receive exemption for all or a portion of the University drill requirements upon presenting a petition to the Office of the Dean of Student Affairs.

Substitution of athletics for drill: At the beginning of each quarter those students who are required to drill will register and report for their drill and report for same until such time as the coach in charge of that branch of athletics has selected his first string men. The coach will then submit this list to Mr. Luehring. By him it will be forwarded to the Office of the Dean of Student Affairs, where record will be made of substitution of athletics for drill for that quarter, proper record being made in the Registrar's Office and the Military Department in form.

Note: Mere turning out for any branch of athletics will not entitle the student to release from his drill requirements for that quarter.

A student desiring to cancel his registration in drill or to postpone drill at any time should present petition to the office of the Dean of Student Affairs and if the reasons are deemed satisfactory such cancellation or postponement will be approved and a proper record made in the Registrar's Office, and the Military Department in form.

Service in the National Guard will not exempt any student from his military obligations in the University

Service in the Naval Reserves will not longer receive exemption credit.
