MEMORIAL SERVICE A Memorial service for Peter Charles Keaveny, 19, Redwood Falls, Minn., and Robert Gordon Lucas, 19, Oakland, Calif., will be held for faculty, students and staff at 2 p.m. Friday, May 1, in the Kirby ballroom. Luca and Keaveny are missing and presumed drowned at the mouth of the Lester River at the east edge of Duluth where the two had been smelt fishing last week. The service is being sponsored by the Council of Religious Advisers.

MALE AWARENESS Friday (May 1) will be a day of male awareness at UMD. First, Herbert Goldberg, a clinical psychologist and psychology professor at California State University, Los Angeles, will present a free, public lecture on "The Hazards of Being Male" as the third and final Thea Johnson Lecture of the year at 10 a.m. at MPAC.
