NOTICE

NATIONAL RIFLE AND PISTOL MATCHES

1. The National Matches for 1919 will be held at the Navy Rifle Range, Caldwell, New Jersey, during the month of August. The National Matches consist of the National Team Match, the National Individual Match, and the National Pistol Match (Individual).

2. The National Matches are preceded by the matches of the National Rifle Association, among them being the Wimbledon Cup Match (the long range championship), the Leech Cup Match, the Marine Corps Cup Match, and the President's Match, each open to everybody and each a classic individual match.

3. The National Rifle Association Matches will be preceded by a number of matches of State Rifle Associations affiliated with the National Rifle Association and held under the auspices of the National Board for the Promotion of Rifle Practice, and a number of special matches held under the auspices of various organizations to stimulate interest and promote skill in marksmanship.

4. Rifles will be furnished at the firing points or visitors may bring their own rifles. An instructor (coach) will be provided at each firing point and when separate parties visit the range special instructors will be assigned to give them preliminary instruction. The range is now open for all comers and groups or teams visiting the range for practice preliminary to participating in the matches will receive special instruction.

5. Beginning about July first daily re-entry matches will be conducted under the auspices of the National Rifle Association and each day there will be awarded medals to the winning competitors and qualification medals to all who qualify in the National Rifle Association, marksman, sharpshooter, and expert rifleman courses. At no time, either before or during the matches, will there be any expense for range practice. Sleeping accommodations will be provided without charge (but sojourners must bring their own blankets), and meals will be furnished at the cost price of the navy ration (now 60 cents per day).

6. A "team" in the National Team Match consists of twelve (12) principals or firers, two or more alternates, one coach, and a team captain who may be, or may not be also a principal or firer. The rules of the match will provide for teams from universities, colleges, and schools, and it is earnestly hoped that a large number of our universities, colleges, military schools, and high schools will be represented by teams.

7. The contesting teams are divided into four groups: U. S. Service Teams, National Guard Teams, School or College Teams, and Civilian Teams, and four trophies are provided—one to the

winning team of each group. Of these teams the National Trophy goes to the team with the highest score, the Hilton trophy to the second, the Bronze Soldier of Marathon to the third, and a new trophy lately provided by Congress to the fourth.

8. It is desired that this year each state be represented by at least one state team, one National Guard Team, and that in addition each university, college and high school, especially those with military features and those having units of the Reserve Officers Training Corps, be represented by teams, and it is suggested that funds for travel expenses and subsistence at the range be raised by subscription or by some special enterprise, or by appropriation from the athletic funds.

9. The rules will not require in the case of school teams that the team captain and coach be matriculates of the institution. They may be selected without regard to matriculation. The principles and alternates should be matriculates, either undergraduates or post graduates, and may include those who have been graduated at end of last session. Subsistence will be furnished at the actual cost of food in the regular navy mess or at a number of different restaurants of different grades and at corresponding prices.

10. At those institutions where there are units of the Reserve Officers Training Corps it is requested that the Army officer, detailed as commanding officer, or Professor of Military Science and Tactics, communicate with the Director of Civilian Marksmanship, War Department, Washington, D. C., in regard to their plans for sending teams. That officer will communicate the information to the Committee on Education and Special Training, War Department, and to the Executive Officer of the National Matches. At other institutions it is requested that the president, superintendent, commandant of cadets or principal take steps to organize a team and communicate with the Director of Civilian Marksmanship in regard to the plans.

11. The fact that teams will have no opportunity for practice prior to their arrival at the range should not operate to prevent their attendance. The National Matches will be also in character a training school in marksmanship, as well as a con-

test, and it is planned that teams so desiring it will be put through a course of instruction designed to qualify them not only as riflemen but also as instructors in rifle, machine gun and pistol practice and teams may assemble at the range at any time hence, or the individual members may each come at times most convenient to them. The range is now open and will remain open until after the National Matches. It will be entirely practicable for any number of candidates for a team to practice at the range, and to select the final team as the result of the practice in the National Match Range. Individual students will be welcomed both for practice and training and for competition in the matches whether or not it is practicable for their institution to be represented by a team. It is desired that this information be given publicity at your institution. It is hoped that at each institution arrangements will be made before the vacation period begins to the end that the students may gather at the National Match range in time for the final organization of a team for the National Team Match in the latter part of August.

12. The rules for the National Matches are now in process of printing and copies of these rules will be sent to each institution sufficient in number for distribution to each prospective candidate for the team. Please state how many copies are desired.

13. In connection with your arrangements for a team for the National Matches you should also communicate with the Adjutant General of your state or territory. The Executive Officer of the National Board for the Promotion of Rifle Practice will keep Adjutants General fully informed in regard to National Match plans.

14. This is written with the sanction and at the instance of the Committee on Education and Special Training and the National Board for the Promotion of Rifle Practice.
