

DULUTH--A five-week Biology Institute, running concurrently with UMD's first Summer Session term opening Monday(June 11), will attract thirty-two high school biology teachers.

All registration for the first session -- expected to draw better than 1,000 students -- will be held between 8 a.m. and 1 p.m. Monday in the Physical Education building.

The Institute, one of 53 planned in the U.S. this summer, was made possible through a \$26,000 National Science Foundation grant. The teachers in attendance will be paid stipends, dependent allowances and mileage to attend the course.

Dr. Blanchard Krogstad, associate professor of biology and director of the institute, and Dr. Edward Flaccus, assistant professor of biology, will conduct morning lectures, demonstrations, discussion and laboratory work.

Donald H. Glittenberg, a visiting lecturer from Lakewood High School (Colorado), and several visiting professors also will address the institute. Three afternoons a week will be spent in field trips.

A new graduate course, Current Trends in Kindergarten Education, is being offered along with nearly 180 other graduate and undergraduate courses.

Ruth E. Green, associate professor of education, points out that the kindergarten course "will help to satisfy new requirements for kindergarten certification in Minnesota."

A Recreational Resources Institute, sponsored by UMD's Division of Social Sciences, has been planned for June 19-21. The institute will consider the many, varied problems of the U.S. public's expanding demand for recreation.
