On Wednesday, April twenty second students all over the United States will be striking against war which threatens in many parts of the world. In striking for peace we are not supporting vague general chimeras, nor are we asking for impossible visionary legislation. We believe that it is possible to keep the United States out of war and to greatly lessen the danger of war throughout the world through definite and specific action by the American government and people. And to these ends we give our wholehearted support to the following measures:

NO AID FOR BELLIGERENTS!

1. We call upon the congress of the United States for strict neutrality legislation and upon the American people to support this legislation. Such strict neutrality means in substance, an embargo on all goods to belligerent countries: it means no loans or credits to warring nations.

KEEP OUR ARMY AND NAVY AT HOME!

2. We oppose the use of American military forces for the protection of American interests abroad. We ask that American armed forces be withdrawn from China, Central America and the other parts of the globe where they now threaten the integrity of independent nations and the peace of the world.

EDUCATION NOT MILITARIZATION!

3. We protest the growing war preparations of our own country and ask congress to divert a considerable portion of the \$900,000,000 armament budget to social rather than anti-social purposes.

PASS THE NYE-KVALE BILL!

4. We are unalterably opposed to the militarization of our own and other campuses and ask immediate passage of the Nye-Kvale bill now before congress, which would abolish compulsory military training in American colleges.

STAINCH OPPOSITION TO WAR!

5. Lastly to reaffirm our unalterable opposition to war, WE REFUSE TO SUPPORT IN ANY WAY A WAR CONDUCTED BY THE UNITED STATES OUTSIDE THE BOUNDARIES OF THE UNITED STATES!

1. We call upon the Congress of the United States for strict neutrality legislation and upon the American people to support this legislation. Such strict neutrality means in substance, an embargo on all goods for re-export to countries; it means no loans or credits to warring nations.

KEEP OUR NAVY AND NAVY AIR FORCE

2. We oppose the use of American military forces for the protection of American interests abroad. We ask that American armed forces be withdrawn from the integrity of independent nations and the peace of the world.

REDUCTION OF MILITARIZATION

3. We protest the growing and unproductive of our own country and ask Congress to divert a considerable portion of the \$200,000,000 annual budget to social rather than anti-social programs.

PASS THE NEUTRALITY BILL

4. We are unalterably opposed to the withdrawal of our own and other countries and are immediately passing on the Neutrality Bill before Congress, which would abolish compulsory military training in foreign countries.

STRICT OPPOSITION TO WAR

5. Strictly to realize our purpose of opposition to war, we request SUPPORT IN ANY WAY A WAR CONDUCTED BY THE UNITED STATES OR BY THE NEUTRAL COUNTRIES OF THE UNITED STATES!
