## WOMAN'S LEAGUE ELECTION TODAY AT SHEVLIN HALL

Contest Between Geneve Wales and Camelia Waite for Presidency Develops Much Interest.

Two girls are candidates for the presidency for next year of the Woman's League. This is the first time in its history that two have been nominated from the council to fill the office of president.

This year the council was unable to decide between two prominent juniors, Geneve Wales and Camelia Waite, and nominated both in order that the girls might decide by ballot. A spirited contest is expected.

## Constitution of Minn. Union Ratified Today

Mass Meeting of All-University Men in Chapel to Pass on Proposed Regulations to Govern Men's Building.—Every Minnesota Man Should Attend This Meeting.

Today at 1:30 every man in college should turn out for the big Minnesota Union mass meeting in chapel. The constitution which appears hereunder, will be taken up and voted on by articles, and every man in school whether he subscribed toward building or not is entitled to and should vote.

The constitution in full follows:

### CONSTITUTION OF THE MINNESOTA UNION

#### ARTICLE I

Section 1.—The name of the association shall be the Minnesota Union.

#### ARTICLE II

Section 1.—The purpose of this association shall be to promote the best interests and welfare of the University of Minnesota, and comradeship among its members and to erect and maintain a suitable club house for such purposes.

#### ARTICLE III

Section 1.—The club-house shall be located on the campus of the University of Minnesota.

#### ARTICLE IV

Section 1.—All male students of the University of Minnesota shall be active members of the Minnesota Union and all other members of the University of Minnesota shall be eligible to active membership.

Section 2.—All past members of the University of Minnesota shall be eligible to associate membership.

Section 3.—Members in either of the above classes shall be eligible to life membership; past members of the University of Minnesota, students in post graduate departments and members of the faculty may become life members upon the payment of a twenty-five dollar fee to the treasurer of the Minnesota Union.

Section 4.—The Minnesota Union may elect honorary members not to exceed three living, upon nomination of the Board of Governors, by a two thirds vote of the active membership voting at a special meeting called for this purpose.

Section 5.—The term "Member of the University" wherever used in this Constitution, shall be interpreted to include the male regents, officers, faculty and students of the University of Minnesota.

Section 6.—Only active and life members shall have the right to vote.

#### ARTICLE V

Organization and government.

Section 1.—The government of the Minnesota Union, subject to the Board

of Regents of the University of Minnesota, shall be vested in a Board of Governors, and the officers of this Board of Governors shall be the corresponding officers of the Minnesota Union.

Section 2.—The Board of Governors shall be constituted as follows:

Two members of the faculty of the University of Minnesota. One member of the General Alumni Association, who shall not be regent, officer or member of the faculty of the University of Minnesota. Three members of the senior classes of the Academic Division. Three members of the senior classes of the Engineering Division. Two members of the senior classes of the Law Division. Three members of the senior classes of the Medicine Division. When in any division there are more than two governors to be elected at the same annual election not more than two shall be elected from any one college or school in that division.

Section 3.—For purposes of nomination and election to the Board of Governors, the student active and life membership of the Minnesota Union shall be grouped into the following four divisions:

A.—Academic Division, to include members enrolled in the College of Science, Literature and the Arts, the College of Agriculture, the College of Education, and the Graduate School.

B.—Engineering division to include members enrolled in the College of Engineering and the Mechanic Arts, the School of Mines and the School of Chemistry.

C.—Law Division to include members enrolled in the College of Law.

D.—Medic Division. To include members enrolled in the College of Medicine and Surgery, the College of Homeopathic Medicine and Surgery, the College of Dentistry and the College of Pharmacy. Any change or amendment of the foregoing plan shall be made only by an amendment to this constitution.

Section 4.—All members of the Board of Governors shall be members of the Minnesota Union.

Section 5.—The Faculty governors shall be elected at the annual election, by those members of the University faculty who are members of the Minnesota Union.

The alumni governor shall be elected from among the life members of the General Alumni Association, by the Board of Directors of said Association, for a term of three years, at its regular April meeting.

At the first annual election, one faculty governor shall be elected for a term of one year, and the second faculty governor shall be elected for a term of two years, and thereafter their successors shall be elected for terms of three years each.

Section 6.—The undergraduate governors as above provided, shall be elected (Continued on third page.)

## MINNESOTA NAILS SECOND HAWKEYE HIDE TO FENCE

Iowa Ball Tossers Dropt Second Contest to Gophers Saturday.—Phillips Stars at Bat.

In a game replete with errors and ragged fielding, Minnesota again bested Iowa Saturday afternoon by a score of 6 to 4.

The coldness of the weather stiffened the men and base throwing was decidedly off color.

Iowa made one run in the first inning when Stewart drew a pass to first, stole second, went to third on a long fly by Kirk and scored on a passed ball. The third inning proved to be a woeful one for Minnesota fans. Sutherland made a clean swipe over second. Stewart forced him and Wilson reached first on a wild throw by Phillips. Both men advanced a base when Phillips threw to second which was uncovered. Kirk drove a hot grounder down the third base line which Caldwell handled cleverly and by a quick throw to Rand managed to get the Hawkeye second baseman in the chase. Thru an unfortunate error by Rand, two men scored, Kirk going to third, scoring a moment later on an in field out.

Minnesota began her scoring in the last half of the third. Phillips led off with a long drive to left field, and when the dust cleared off he was safely perched on third.

Walker hit over third, scoring Phillips. Ernst got out, but the runner scored on a passed ball and a muff by Carberry.

The fourth inning proved to be a winner for the varsity. A life was given Kesting on a wild throw by Wilson. Caldwell was safe due to an error by Johanson. Rand walked. Phillips placed a clean single to (Continued on fourth page.)

## OBERLIN WINS CONTEST

"Evolution of Conscience" Was the Prize Oration—Chicago Withdraws From the League.

In the Northern Oratorical League contest at Iowa City Friday night, Jesse F. Williams of Oberlin won first place and the prize of \$100, with an oration, "The Evolution of Conscience." E. E. Robinson of Wisconsin, second, with "The Frontier Man." An immense crowd filled the Auditorium and all the contestants were treated royally thruout their stay.

At the business meeting of the League Chicago withdrew from the union and the University of Illinois was named as her successor, the next contest to be held at Champaign instead of Chicago as formerly planned.

Harter was the delegate from the Minnesota chapter of Delta Sigma Rho to the national convention of the fraternity held in Iowa City, May 2. At the convention, Syracuse, Missouri, Virginia, George Washington and Indiana universities were granted charters and resolutions in memory of Prof. E. E. McDermott, unanimously adopted. Gustave Loewinger of Minnesota was named chairman of the executive committee for the following year.

## DEBATE TRIALS TONIGHT

Preliminaries To Choose Intercollegiate Debaters To Be Held in Chapel—Twenty-five Entries.

The tryouts for the inter-collegiate debating teams will take place in chapel at 7 o'clock tonight. About 25 men have signified their intention of entering the contests.

The question for the debate will be, "Resolved, that further material increases in the United States Navy are undesirable." All men entering must hand in their names and the side they intend to take by this afternoon. Four minutes will be allowed each man for constructive argument and two minutes for rebuttal.

Six men and three alternates will be chosen to represent Minnesota in her two debates this fall. The opposing colleges will be Iowa and Illinois.

at the annual election by the student members of the Minnesota Union, enrolled in that division of the membership of the Minnesota Union, of which they are members.

Section 7.—Nominations of candidates for election to the Board of Governors shall be made by the Board of Governors, at least three weeks previous to the annual election as hereafter provided, by the Board of Governors nominating at least two candidates for each governorship. Any further nominations shall be made by petition to the Board of Governors at least one week before the annual election. Such petitions shall be signed by at least ten members of the Minnesota Union enrolled in the same division as the candidate for nomination, and for this purpose the faculty governors shall be considered a division.

Section 8.—The annual election shall be held on the third Wednesday in April of each year and shall be by the Australian ballot system, the polls being open from eight o'clock a. m. until four o'clock p. m. on election day. The officers in charge of the polls shall be appointed by the President of the Board of Governors with the advice and consent of the Board of Governors. There shall be no voting by proxy.

The person receiving the greatest number of votes shall be declared elected. In case of a tie another election for that governorship shall be held within five days.

Section 9.—The new Board of Governors shall assume its duties the first Monday in May of each year. At the first meeting, the Board of Governors shall elect from its number a president, vice-president and a secretary; and as before provided these officers shall be the corresponding officers of the Minnesota Union. Until the new board elects its president the retiring president, shall act as chairman.

Section 10.—The Cashier of the University of Minnesota, Mr. J. D. Brennan and successors, shall be the treasurer of the Minnesota Union.

Section 11.—The government of the Minnesota Union shall be vested in a Board of Governors as herein before provided. This Board of Governors shall be the sole judge of the eligibility of its members and successors; and in case of vacancy shall elect a member to fill such vacancy.

It shall be the duty of the Board of Governors to make nominations; to provide for elections; to employ a manager, to supervise his actions and take his bond; to call special meetings of the Minnesota Union to hear appeals and complaints; to suspend and expel members; to act upon proposed amendments; to nominate for election by the Minnesota Union, honorary members; to make amend or repeal by-laws by a two-thirds vote; to advise concerning and approve appointments of the President of the Board of Governors; to authorize all expenditures that are necessary for the operation and maintenance of the Union, the Commons, and all equipment and service connected therewith; to provide ways and means for the raising of funds to meet the expenses of the Minnesota Union, and to make any and all regulations, rules and provisions and to use any means which it shall deem fit and necessary to promote the best welfare and interests of the Minnesota Union.

Section 12.—The President of the Board of Governors shall preside at all meetings of the Board of Governors and shall be ex-officio member of all committees. He shall appoint with the advice and consent of the Board of Governors all committees, standing and special and all officers and judges of election. He shall

have an office in the Union with daily office hours.

Section 13.—The Vice-President of the Board of Governors shall discharge all the duties and exercise all the rights of president, in the latter's absence, and shall be ex-officio chairman of the House Committee. He shall have an office in the Union with daily office hours.

Section 14.—The Secretary of the Board of Governors shall keep all records of the Board of Governors and of the Minnesota Union. He shall give notice of all meetings and sessions as ordered by the Board of Governors.

Section 15.—The Treasurer of the Minnesota Union shall, under the direction of the Finance Committee, have in charge, all funds of the Minnesota Union, keep all financial accounts, collect the dues of members, and pay out all expenditures. He shall be a member of the Finance Committee, and shall as often as the Finance Committee directs, submit a complete report of the financial status of the Minnesota Union. He shall have such further powers and duties as the Board of Governors may from time to time deem necessary and provide.

**ARTICLE SIX.  
The Manager.**

Section 1.—The Board of Governors shall employ a competent manager, who shall not be connected with any other society, club or institution related in any way with the University of Minnesota, at a salary to be determined by the Board of Governors.

Section 2.—He shall devote his entire time to the Union and the Commons and under direction of the Board of Governors shall have charge of the management of the Union and the Commons.

Section 3.—He shall employ and discharge all employees. He shall be responsible for the care of the minor repairs.

Section 4.—He shall, as manager of the Commons under the direction of the Committee on Finance and the Commons, provide for its maintenance and service and purchase all necessary supplies and provisions.

Section 5.—He shall have charge under the direction of the House Committee, of all billiard and pool tables, bowling alleys and any other undertaking from which a revenue is derived.

Section 6.—He shall be responsible to the House Committee for the enforcement of all House Rules and to the Committee on Finance and the Commons for all receipts and expenditures.

Section 7.—He shall be required to furnish a bond satisfactory to the Board of Governors.

**ARTICLE SEVEN.  
Standing Committees.**

Section 1.—There shall be the following standing committees: the House Committee on Finance and the Commons.

Section 2.—The House Committee shall be composed of five members of the Minnesota Union, of whom the Vice-President of the Board of Governors shall be chairman.

The House Committee shall make and provide for the enforcement of all House Rules and publish them in the official paper of the University of Minnesota at least once in the first two weeks of each school year, post a copy on the bulletin board in the Union, and furnish each member with a copy.

The House Committee shall decide all questions of dispute arising as to infringement of the house rules and privileges, and in case of repeated offense shall inflict any just penalty or fine upon the member guilty of such offense. Any appeal from a decision of the House Committee shall be heard before the Board of Governors.

The House Committee shall have power to grant the use of a room or rooms in the Union for special occasions. Any

and all applications for the use of any room or rooms in the Union shall be filed with the House Committee, thru its chairman. All applications shall be made upon blanks provided, stating definitely by their respective names or numbers the room or rooms desired, the hours in which they are to be used and shall be endorsed by the names of three members of the Minnesota Union who shall be held responsible for the room or rooms during the time specified.

The House Committee shall have the power to grant for periodical use for the college year or any part thereof, the use of room or rooms to any organization of University men upon application to the House Committee similar to the above, by such organization, provided that such application shall specify the dates and the hours therein through the college year or such part thereof as may be specified, for which the use of the room or rooms is requested, provided further that any deviations from such schedule shall be governed by the ordinary procedure.

All billiard and pool tables, bowling alleys, card tables, and complementary equipments shall be under the directions of the House Committee, which shall have the power, under the Board of Governors to determine the amount and means of collection of a reasonable fee therefor.

The House Committee shall have charge of all libraries of the Minnesota Union, their maintenance and replacement, the purchasing of books, the subscription to periodicals and papers, and shall make such further provisions under the Board of Governors, as it may deem necessary.

Section 3.—The Committee on Finance and the Commons shall consist of five members, including the Cashier of the University. The Chairman shall be a faculty governor.

The Committee on Finance and the Commons shall have charge of all funds of the Minnesota Union.

No expenditures shall be paid out by the Treasurer without the authority of the Committee on Finance and the Commons and the signature of its chairman.

It shall be the duty of this committee to keep the Board of Governors informed at all times of the financial conditions of the Minnesota Union by any means the Board of Governors may direct, and to suggest ways and means of raising funds necessary to meet the expenses of the Minnesota Union.

This Committee shall invest all surplus funds of the Minnesota Union in securities approved by the Board of Governors.

It shall be the duty of this committee to co-operate with the manager in the direction and management of the Commons and to make and execute such provisions and regulations, under the Board of Governors, which it shall deem necessary for the best welfare and interests of the Commons.

**ARTICLE VIII.  
Dues and Indebtedness.**

Section 1.—The annual dues for each active member shall be four dollars.

All active membership dues payable by students, enrolled in the University of Minnesota must be paid in the same manner and installments and at the same time as they pay their regular semester or term fees to the Cashier of the University.

All other active membership dues shall be paid in full to the Cashier of the University on or before October first of each year.

Section 2.—Associate members living within twenty-five miles of the University campus shall pay three dollars, and all other associate members two dollars as annual dues to the Treasurer of the Minnesota Union in full on or before October first of each year.

Section 3.—Life membership fees shall be paid as herein before provided, in Section 4, Article IV. Life membership fees shall be kept intact and only the income therefrom shall be used.

Section 4.—The Board of Governors shall have the power to change the amount of the active membership dues at their discretion, provided that such change and changes shall apply equally and proportionately to all the members; provided further that such changes shall not have effect for more than one year, unless subsequently ratified by an amendment to this constitution.

Section 5.—No member shall be allowed to become indebted to the Union.

Section 6.—No one, unless duly authorized by the Board of Governors shall be allowed to incur any indebtedness for the Minnesota Union, and the Board of Governors shall at no time incur any indebtedness in excess of the amount of money in the Treasury.

Section 7.—All members of the University of Minnesota and others, who shall have pledged twenty-five dollars or more towards a fund for the erection of the building for the Minnesota Union and who shall have in the due course of time fulfilled all conditions of such pledge, shall by virtue of such gift and payment become life members of the Minnesota Union and enjoy all privileges accompanying such membership.

**ARTICLE IX.  
Prohibition against Gambling and the Use of Alcoholic Beverages.**

Section 1.—Gambling in any form whatsoever is forever prohibited in the Union. The sale and use of alcoholic beverages is forever prohibited in the Union.

**ARTICLE X.  
Privileges of Organizations of University Men.**

Section 1.—Any organization of men in the University of Minnesota may secure the use of a room or rooms in the Union to be used temporarily for some special occasion or purpose upon application to the House Committee as provided in Article VII, Section 2, Paragraph 4.

Section 2.—Any organization of men in the University of Minnesota may secure the use of a room or rooms in the Union for periodical temporary use by making application to the House Committee as provided in Article VII, Section 2, Paragraph 5.

Section 3.—The Young Men's Christian Association of the University of Minnesota shall have the permanent and exclusive use of the following quarters in the Union:

On the first floor: One room suitable for a private office for the General Secretary; immediately adjoining and connecting this office from opposite sides, one room suitable for a waiting room; one room suitable for the Assistant General Secretary and the stenographer.

On the second floor: One room suitable for an office, to contain desks for the President, Finance Chairman and Alumni Treasurer of the Association; one room suitable for the use of the cabinet and the Advisory Board of the Association, with a closet adjoining for the storing of

 The right of this Association to use any other rooms for meetings and gatherings, religious or otherwise at any time shall be obtained by making the usual application to the Chairman of the House Committee.  
 In the use of its quarters, this Association shall not exercise any function of the Minnesota Union but shall use them strictly for the work of the Association.  
**ARTICLE XI.**  
 Suspensions and Expulsions.  
 Section 1.—Any member of the Minnesota Union may be suspended or expelled from membership, or cause, by a two thirds vote of the Board of Governors. But at least one week before such action is to be taken, the Secretary shall send to such member a written copy of the charges preferred against him. At the request of this member, he shall have a hearing before the Board of Governors.  
**ARTICLE XII.**  
 Meetings and Quorums.  
 Section 1.—The annual meeting of the Minnesota Union and installation of governors shall be held on the fourth Wednesday in April each year.  
 Section 2.—Special meetings of the Minnesota Union may be called for a specific purpose, by the President of the Board of Governors or on petition to the Board of Governors in writing of fifty active members. Notice of such special meetings shall be posted in the Union and published in the official paper of the University at least three days previous.  
 Section 3.—For the transaction of business by the Union, fifty active members shall constitute a quorum. If a quorum be wanting, the members present may adjourn the meeting to such date as they may deem desirable.  
 Section 4.—The Board of Governors shall meet on the last Monday of every month during the college year, (except in case of vacation, when other provision shall be made,) and also on the first Monday in May, and on a Monday in September at least ten days previous to the opening of the college year.  
 Section 5.—Any special meeting of the Board of Governors may be called by the President of the Board of Governors, either upon his own initiative or written request of two Governors.  
 Section 6.—For the ordinary transaction of business by the Board of Governors, eight governors shall constitute a quorum. If a quorum be wanting, the governors present may adjourn the meeting to such a date as they may deem desirable.  
**ARTICLE XIII.**  
 Amendments.  
 Section 1.—Amendments to this Constitution may be proposed either by the Board of Governors or by a petition signed by fifty active members, submitted to the Board of Governors.  
 Section 2.—All proposed amendments shall be posted in the Union and published in the official paper of the University of Minnesota at least twice; the first time at least two weeks, the second time at least one week, before the date, which the Board of Governors has set as the one on which such amendment is to be submitted to the vote of the Union.  
 Section 3.—An amendment may be made to this constitution in the following manner; by being passed first by a majority vote of the Board of Governors, by being passed second by a two thirds affirmative vote of the sum resulting from the addition of the total number of active members and the number of life members voting.  
**ARTICLE XIV.**  
 Provisions for the Initial Organization.  
 Section 1.—For the year 1908, wherever in this constitution meetings and elections are required to be held in the month of April such meetings and elections shall be held on date corresponding as nearly as possible in the month of May.  
 Section 2.—For the purpose of organization, the provisional organizing council shall be substituted for the Board of Governors and wherever sections in this constitution are temporarily impossible of fulfillment, the said council shall make such provision as it sees fit.
