Mlle. MARGUERITE CLEMENT of France will give a lecture at the University of Minnesota in the Little Theater at 4:30 o'clock, Tuesday, February eleventh. Her subject will be, "Where French and American Educators Differ and Sometimes Disagree." It will be in English.

Mlle. Clement is one of the progressive women of her nation, and is a graduate of the University of Paris, which conferred upon her its highest degree, that of Agregee. From her fourteenth year, Mlle. Clement completed her education entirely through the scholarships she won. Under the Kahn Scholarship (University of Paris), she went half way around the world, and, when in Egypt, delivered the first lecture ever given before Egyptian women.

Mlle. Clement was the first exchange Professor and Lecturer for Women in Newham and Girton Colleges, Cambridge (England). She was formerly Professor in the Lycee de Bordeaux, and now holds the chair of French Language and Literature in the Lycee de Versailles. She has spoken in nearly all of the leading colleges of France.

Mlle. Clement is a member of the editorial staff of L'Oeuvre of Paris. Her writings deal with social questions and now especially with after-the-war problems. She has been actively interested in furthering a fuller understanding and a richer exchange of benefits between France and America. She speaks English very fluently.

The public is invited to attend this lecture, which will be of particular value to those interested in secondary and higher education.

Miss Lane is Supervising Vocational Teacher in the Department of Attendance, Minneapolis Public Schools, and she has had extended experience in making surveys. The lecture is given in connection with Miss Ball's course in Vocational Guidance, and all who are interested in Vocational Education are cordially invited to attend.
