RHODES SCHOLARSHIPS AT OXFORD UNIVERSITY

Two Rhodes Scholarships at Oxford University, England, are open this fall to graduates of Minnesota colleges. The conditions have been simplified. A state committee will select the two scholars. Each qualified institution in the state will certify a group of its students as qualified. The University of Minnesota may nominate eight for consideration by the state committee. The candidates must have had a minimum of two years of college work.

The Rhodes Scholarship pays three hundred pounds yearly with privileges not only of study at Oxford, but of English and European travel in the long vacation. There could be no more interesting time than the present for study and travel in England and on the continent. Oxford University is making a greater effort than ever before to meet the needs of foreign, especially American, students.

The fact that two scholars are to be chosen and that the University of Minnesota may present eight candidates should encourage our students to apply. Blank applications may be obtained at the Graduate School office, 204 Library Building, and should be filed at an early date, as the final applications must go to the State Committee not later than October 5.

STUDENTS TAKING CHEMISTRY

Every student registered for any course in Chemistry, must purchase a \$5.00 Chemistry Supply Card at the Cashier's Window, Library Building, and present this card for certification at the General Stockroom Office of the School of Chemistry before desks will be assigned or supplies can be secured.

ADVANCED ORGANIC CHEMISTRY

The course in Heterocyclic Compounds (Chemistry 132f), announced by Dean Jones for the fall quarter, will not be offered in 1919-20. By request he will offer in its place a course in the Chemistry of the Carbo-Hydrates (Chemistry 133f) for the fall quarter only, and open to undergraduates and graduates who have taken Elementary Organic Chemistry. It will be given the third hour on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays.

FOODS AND COOKERY FOR ARTS COLLEGE STUDENTS

A section in Home Economics 20 in Foods and Cookery has been especially arranged for students in the College of Science, Literature, and the Arts for Monday, Wednesday, and Friday, 5th and 6th hours, Room 203, Home Economics Building. The prerequisites for this course are Animal Biology, 10 credits or equivalent, and Chemistry 1 or 9 paralled. This section is limited to twenty students.

III. Payment of fees

REGISTRATION PROCEDURE FOR STUDENTS WHO HAVE PAID FEES BY MAIL

1. Secure receipt for fees paid and deposit card at the Cashier's Window, Library Rotunda.

2. Report for assignment of courses at places indicated in procedure for new students.

"WAR SERVICE TUITION"

If you are entitled to "War Service Tuition" secure your fee statement in the regular manner. Do not pay any tuition fee, health fee, or Minnesota Union fee. Write the words "War Service Tuition" on each of the three statements and hand them to the University Cashier. The amount charged for "Deposit Card" must be paid by everyone. If you have previously had an application accepted under the free tuition law you need not turn in additional application blanks. If this is your first application, secure the proper blanks, fill them out in triplicate, have them certified by a Notary Public, and turn them in at Window No. 10, Registrar's office, together with your discharge papers or a copy thereof, certified by an army, navy, or marine officer.

Students are cautioned not to lose their Deposit Cards. In case of loss a second card will have to be purchased.
