Following rules are adopted for Parking and Non-Parking on the University Campus:

Parking Allowed—

- On South side of Arlington Avenue between 15th Avenue and 17th Avenue—Road along N P tracks.
- On Dirt Road opposite Folwell Hall and Physics.
- On South side of Pillsbury Avenue.
- On West side of Church Street between Washington Avenue and Beacon Street.
- On ground North of Engineering Buildings.
- On North side Pillsbury Avenue at Parkng Lne.

No Parking—

- On 15th Avenue from University Avenue to Washington Avenue
- On North side of Pillsbury Avenue between 15th Avenue and University Avenue.

GENERAL EXTENSION DIVISION

A discussion group in questions of science and religion is being arranged this year by the University of Minnesota Extension Division. The group will be conducted by George P. Conger, Assistant Professor of Philosophy, who is an ordained minister.

According to Professor Conger, there are six possible ways of adjusting the claims of science and those of religion. These will be examined in the course, and both sides of each argument will be stated. Special attention will be given to the theory of evolution, which will be considered both from the scientific and the religious points of view. The course will be arranged to include discussions of any new material which may appear during the fall or winter. The class meets on Tuesday evenings at 7:30 in Folwell 322, main University campus.
