## GIRLS FINISH SEASON WITH NEBRASKA CONTEST

**Fast Game in the Armory To-Night—Girls Are Royally Entertained.**

The Nebraska girl's quint arrived yesterday morning, in good shape, determined to atone for their recent defeat at the hands of the Gophers. Nebraska comes with a clean record with the exception of the Minnesota game which was only lost in the extra five minutes of play.

## CONSTITUTION TAKES FORM

**Club House Will Be on Campus—Government Vested in Board of Upperclassmen.**

The constitution of the Minnesota Union is being ground out clause by clause. Some few things have already been provisionally settled.

The club house is to be located on the campus at some suitable place designated by the board of regents. All the men of the University will be eligible to active membership and past students may become associate members. The government is to be vested in a board of governors consisting of three members of the University faculty, three members of the senior class of the academic college, two members from the senior law and senior engineering classes and one each from the senior classes of the mining, dental, medical, pharmacy and the agricultural colleges. All members of the governing board must be members of the union, and the faculty members must be elected by the faculty. The clubhouse will be in charge of a hired manager engaged by the board of governors. Four standing committees have been decided upon—House, Finance, Commons and Amusements.
