

DULUTH--Among new faces on the UMD campus staff and faculty this fall are:

Peter C. Apostolakos, associate professor and head of psychology, who has returned to the UMD faculty after a two-year absence including doctoral study under a Danforth Foundation grant at the Minneapolis campus and personnel administration with the Duluth, Missabe and Iron Range railway. A native of Minneapolis, Professor Apostolakos received the B. S. degree from Duluth State Teachers college in 1947, the M.A. from the U of M in 1949 and the Ph.D. from the U of M in 1957. He formerly taught at UMD from 1950 to 1956.

Robert S. Bufalini, instructor of English, is a native of Ambridge, Pa., a graduate of Ambridge high school and a B. S. graduate of State Teachers college, Indiana, Pa., and an M. A. graduate of Northwestern university. He is completing doctoral requirements at Northwestern. He formerly taught at Illinois Institute of Technology.

Bruce J. Rutherford, senior student personnel worker, is a native of Duluth, was graduated from Superior Central, attended Wisconsin State college at Superior and received the B. A. degree from UMD. He attended the Naval Officers Reserve corps school and served with the navy in Newfoundland as assistant communications officer.
