MEMBERS' TICKETS

A certain number of the recreational events scheduled must be limited in attendance to members of the Summer Session; certain others, such as the dramatic presentations and the Concert Course, are offered at special prices to members. To provide admission for these events members are issued tickets, non-transferable, without charge, upon presentation of their bursar's fee receipts. Provision is made for their issue during registration hours in the lobby of the Registrar's office in the Administration Building, and at the Registrar's office on the Farm Campus. All members should secure the tickets.

Restricted events are designated by number in the calendar for the week; the corresponding number is punched when admission is given to the event, or when tickets are sold. Events not so indicated are open to the public.

SUMMER CONCERT COURSE

For the first time the University of Minnesota is presenting a complete Summer Concert Course. During the regular school year the students are privileged to attend concerts by the most famous artists. Mrs. Carlyle Scott's courses have become a tradition at Minnesota and throughout the country. Feeling that the members of the Summer Session would appreciate the opportunity of attending a similar course the Administration has arranged a series of four events, in addition to the regular recreational program.

The first event, Friday, June 27, is the Fisk Jubilee Singers, pre-eminent in negro ensemble singing. Tuesday, July 1, brings Alberto Salvi, harp virtuoso. Salvi is hailed today as the greatest concert harpist the world has ever produced. The Chicago Art

Theater will present Sudermann's "Fires of St. John" Tuesday evening, July 15. And finally, the course is brought to a triumphant close with the presentation of "Martha," Von Flow's opera. Paul Althouse, tenor, from the Metropolitan Opera company; Eunice Steen, soprano, Maria Matyas, contralto, and Howard Laramy, baritone, from the American Opera Company, will sing the leading roles.

The Concert Course will be offered to members of the Summer Session for \$2.50. Course tickets are \$3.00 for non-members. Single admissions are \$1.00 for each event. Course tickets will be placed on sale today in the box office at the Northrop Auditorium.

COME ONE, COME ALL!

By special arrangement with the University Singers Victor Herbert's comic opera, Wizard of the Nile, will be presented for the second time on the campus. The first production of the opera, during the Winter quarter, proved such a success that the Summer Session Administration engaged the Singers to present Wizard of the Nile as an opening attraction on the recreational program.

The opera will be offered *without charge* to the members of the Summer Session. Be sure to bring your member's ticket next Friday night at 8:15 to the Northrop Auditorium, and see Wizard of the Nile. Non-members will be charged fifty cents admission.

CONVOCATION

At 10:00 a.m. Thursday, June 19, Judge Florence E. Allen will deliver the opening Convocation address in the Northrop Auditorium. Judge Allen is a member of the Ohio Supreme Court; the first woman to be elected to that position. She will speak Thursday morning on: The Noise of History.

ATHLETIC RECREATION

The program of extra-curricular activities is provided for Summer Session students in the interests of a balanced ration of work and play.

Athletic activities on the recreation program for the Summer Session students will include golf, tennis, playground ball, volley ball, handball, horseshoes, squash, and swimming. Playing space, and equipment except racquets, clubs and balls for tennis and golf,

are provided and the whole program is supervised and directed as needed.

Golf

The University Recreation Field Golf Course is open to all members of the Summer Session, students or faculty. The club house is located on Cleveland Avenue, St. Pau., six-tenths of a mile north of the Agricultural College buildings. There is a stop at Cleveland Avenue on the inter-campus car line for those who wish to use that line in reaching the course. The grounds fee is 35 cents (nine holes); coupon books good for ten rounds are sold for \$3.00. Membership cards will be issued free of charge to students and faculty of the Summer Session from Room 108 of the University Armory.

Tennis

The University Tennis Courts on Washington Avenue are available to students of the Summer Session who have purchased the tennis privilege card. The charge for these cards is fifty cents and is issued only to those students who have paid first term Summer Session fees. The courts are provided with nets. Members of the faculty and students not in residence may procure tennis cards for a fee of \$1.00 per term. Cards purchased for the second term of the Summer Session will be good for play to September 15.

Volley Ball

During the Summer Quarter, volley ball is one of the most popular games for students and faculty. Courts are installed in Northrop Field. Groups meet for play at four o'clock every afternoon except Saturday and Sunday. Teams are organized. Equipment is furnished by the Athletic Department. All who enjoy the game or desire to play are invited to report Thursday, June 19 at four o'clock or any afternoon thereafter.

Tournaments

Tournaments in tennis singles and doubles, golf, horseshoe, volley ball and playground ball are being arranged. Posted on the athletic bulletin board in the University Post Office is a large registration card for those who wish to enter the individual tournaments. Registrations close Monday, June 23. Gold and silver medals are awarded to the winner and runner up.

EXCURSIONS

The administration has arranged for three or more trips each week of the Summer Session to points of interest in and around the Twin Cities. This will give students opportunity for that education which may be secured through personal contact with the civic, social, and cultural institutions beyond our University campus.

PILLSBURY FLOUR MILLS

The first of these trips will be to Pillsbury A Mill, the largest flour mill in the world, Thursday, June 19. The party will leave the front steps of the Library at 2:00 p.m. The entire trip requires about two hours and the guides make every minute very interesting as well as instructive.
