Cellist to Appear On Orchestra Bill Tomorrow Night

Oscar Koch, Minneapolis Symphony Member, Is Guest Artist

Oscar Koch, cellist with the Minneapolis Symphony orchestra, will appear as soloist tomorrow night in Northrop Auditorium with the Twin Cities Civic orchestra as that organization makes its last scheduled campus appearance of the Summer Session. The program will get under way at 8 p.m.

Mr. Koch will be heard in one number, Saint-Saen's "Concerto in A Minor." He will play the Opus 33 from the concerto for violoncello and orchestra in one movement. Bernard Andersen will be the guest conductor for the program.

Saint-Saen's "Danse Macabre" is also included in the orchestral program along with Schubert's "Unfinished Symphony" and numbers by Massenet and Rameau.

Voice Analysis Lecture Topic Today; American Neutrality Topic Thursday

A firm believer in Ben Jonson's statement that "language most shows a man: speak that I may see thee," J. Hubert Scott, member of the department of English at the University of Iowa will speak on "Voice Analysis" today at 3 p.m. in the Burton hall auditorium. "The Problems of American Neutrality" will be the subject of Charles A. McLaughlin, instructor in political science, at 3 p.m. Thursday in the Music auditorium. Both lectures are open to summer session students and the general public without charge.

Grahn Will Show Jungle Pictures At U. Convocation

African adventure as recorded by the movie camera will be the Convocation fare tomorrow at 11 a.m. in Northrop auditorium as Gustave Grahn, St. Paul globe trotter and cameraman, presents an illustrated lecture of his recent motion picture expedition into the jungles of East Africa.

Unusual closeups of jungle beasts and of tribes never before photographed are highlighted in the travelogue. The Twin City camera explorer spent four months on a private safari into the East African jungle in order to get his films, travelling into the interior of the Tanganyika country.

Born in Sweden only a few miles south of the Arctic circle, Mr. Grahn started his travels as a youth, travelling to America. Travel and a search for the unusual soon became his avocation and along with his graduate studies at two European universities he developed a hobby for photography which became so absorbing that he now processes his films in his own laboratory.

With a large stock of film and a camera specially constructed to fit his purposes, he began his African expedition a few years ago. With the camera he caught the lion in its natural habitat, utilizing the supply truck of the expedition to lure the lions within camera range. A dead animal was attached to the truck for bait and the lions were lured along in that way.

Among other sequences which he caught were those of Grant's gazelles sprinting along the veldt, the giraffe, hippo, and crocodile. The shots of lions were accomplished without blinds or cover of any kind being used.

Turning his camera from the animal life to the natives of the region, Mr. Grahn photographed the life of strange tribes, some of whom had never before been before the camera. Included in these portrayals of native life are weird ceremonies, tribal dances and one of the few pictures of a native wedding ceremony ever filmed.

The final convocation of the second term is scheduled to take place at 11 a.m. Thursday, August 12, in Northrop auditorium when Radhakamal Mukerjee, Hindu sociologist, speaks on "Migrant Asia."

RECREATIONAL ACTIVITIES FOR SUMMER SCHOOL

Tennis: The 34 tennis courts on Washington Avenue will be available for students daily from 7 a.m. until dark, except Sundays, when the courts will be open from 8:30 to 10:30 a.m. and from 1:30 p.m. until dark. Cards entitling persons to the use of these courts may be obtained from the attendants at the tennis courts for \$1.00 for each session of summer school.

Golf: Identification cards entitling students to play on the University Golf Course may be obtained at the information window in the lobby of the Athletic Building. Rates for students and faculty are 50 cents for 18 holes or a book of 10 tickets for \$4.50. All persons holding cards may play for 35 cents a round before 10:30 a.m. and after 5:00 p.m. except on Sundays and holidays. A season membership entitling one to play an unlimited number of rounds all season is available to students and faculty for \$20.

Swimming: The recreation pool in the Men's Athletic Building will be open for recreational swimming from 1:30 to 5:30 each week day Except Saturday.

Tournaments: There will be tennis, golf and possibly badminton tournaments conducted during the second term of the summer school with prizes given to the winners. Entries may be made by signing names on the bulletin board in the post office, or by calling at the information window in the Athletic Building.

Evening Socials: All members of the summer session are invited to enjoy the social evenings in the Minnesota Union usually held on Friday evenings. First social will be Friday, July 30. Admission free on presentation of fee statements.

Horseshoes: Four horseshoes courts are located at the east end of the tennis courts on Washington Avenue. Shoes may be borrowed from the tennis court attendant without charge.

Men who wish may use the facilities of the gymnasium in the Athletic Building. Towel cards entitling one to towels and a locker for the entire session may be obtained at the information window in the Athletic Building for \$1.25. Basketballs, handballs, volley ball equipment, badminton rackets and nets may be borrowed from the attendant in the locker room.

Ballots Seek Ideas On Length of Term

Summer session students are being asked to vote their preference as to the length of the summer term in a poll that is being conducted through the University post office during both terms of the summer session. Ballots for second term students were placed in the post office boxes on Monday.

Three alternatives as to the length of the summer term will be presented in the ballot which will go into the post office box of every student. These alternatives include (1) the two-term session with each term of five and one-half to six weeks as at present, (2) a single eight-week term, or (3) a full 11-week quarter during the summer.

The poll is being taken to determine the general sentiment in regard to the length of the term and when the results are tabulated the tabulation will be presented to the University administration for consideration.
