Then they went to White Iron Lake, through Echo Trail to Crane Lake and from there by motor boat to Loon River and Sand Point Lake, returning to Duluth with 450 collections, with duplicates. Some of these are first collections for St. Louis County.

Starting July 9th, Dr. Lakela and Miss Elwell plan another two weeks trip to the roadless area north of Kabetogama Lake where travel will be by motor boat, then to Namakan Narrows at Kettle Falls, accessible only by motor boat or plane.
