## STUDENTS MUST CUT OUT WEED

### PLANS ON FOOT TO ENFORCE ANTI-TOBACCO LAW.

No Pupil Under Twenty-one Years of Age Will be Allowed to Hit the Pipe, Pill or Perfecto.

"No member of any public high school or university in the State of Minnesota shall be permitted to use tobacco in any form, and any pupil seen so doing shall be liable to a five or ten dollar fine or imprisonment not to exceed five days."

So say, in substance, the laws of Minnesota, and now Humane Society agent, C. E. Van Exten, in his official capacity, says the law must be enforced. Presumably humanity towards non-smoking students demands that those addicted to the weed, cease to offend.

At any rate, whatever the cause of the proposed crusade, it is certain there is going to be one, and under-aged devotees of "my lady Nicotine" are already laying plans for maintaining their privilege which has been sanctioned, if not by law at least by custom.

When seen yesterday by Daily reporters the faculty were unanimous in declaring that while an enforcement of the rule could in all probability affect (Continued on page 4.)

## POTTER CHOSEN FRESHMAN PREX

### CLASS OF 1909 HOLDS AN ORDERLY ELECTION.

First year men organize their class and choose leaders for year.

At the meeting held Saturday by the Freshman class the following officers were elected: President, Zenas Potter; vice-president, James Beals; secretary, Elsa Ueland; treasurer, Roland Conkey; sergeant-at-arms, John Shirley.

The meeting was orderly throughout and conducted in a manner unusual in Freshman elections.

Wm. Lochren was elected temporary chairman, after which the regular election of officers was held.

Two candidates were nominated for president, Potter and Haldeman. Potter received 67 votes while Haldeman received 55.

Beals, being the only nominee, was unanimously elected vice-president.

For secretary, Elsa Ueland, Mill-cent Lees and John Johnson were nominated. On the first ballot Elsa Ueland was elected by a majority of 102 votes.

Roland Conkey and Niel Jamleson were nominated for treasurer, Conkey winning out by a majority of 16.

John Shirley was unanimously chosen sergeant-at-arms.

The game with Ames was the first fifty-minute contest of the schedule. Despite that fact the team showed especially good endurance and but one substitution was made.

The men from Ames were also in good physical trim and at times when they had the ball and were fighting for first down there was an exhibition, on both sides, of fast play and hard bucking that warmed those in the bleachers.

There was a great tendency in Saturday's game to be off-side. This fault seems to be growing, rather than diminishing. It is an entirely unnecessary fault and the sooner it is corrected the better.

Individually there is little to be said. All the men are coming into their own, and although the work of some has been less conspicuous than that of others, they are not less needed in the game.

## FRESHMAN BOYS DOWN DAKOTANS

### HARRIS PROTEGES SHOW UP IN GOOD FORM.

In spite of wet field the youngsters put up a good article of ball and handle their beefy antagonists very creditably.

On a wet and muddy field the Min-

nesota heavy North Dakota Agricultural College by the score of 4 to 0. The weather was decidedly in favor of the weighty visitors and handicapped the speed of the Freshmen. All through the game the Minnesota men showed themselves superior in team work and general football knowledge, but the Aggies balanced this by weight and fierceness. It was a hard game, and the outcome was in doubt until the latter part of the second half when Frykman was pushed over for the winning score.

During the first half the play was mostly in the

Aggie's territory and was devoid of any spectacular plays. Towards the end of the half the visitors ploughed their way from their 25 yard line to the center of the field, but a possible score was prevented by the calling of time.

In the second half the Freshmen came on the field determined to score.

Moore made a quarterback run of 35 yards, but a minute later Minnesota was penalized 15 yards for holding in the line and Frykman kicked to the Aggies 20 yard line. Here they were held for downs and a few hard line bucks carried Frykman over for a score. After this the Freshmen lapsed into their former condition and the play was about even for the rest of the game.

The work of Harris' proteges surprised everybody.

A great improvement over the previous Saturday's play was evident in spite of the condition of the field, which rendered speed impossible.

Frykman played a good game, but the soggy field prevented any spectacular runs. Moore is still slow in getting off his plays, but is improving. Ertle played well considering his condition. He has only been out since Wednesday. Smith played his usual consistent game at tackle, and with Eakins was the best performer of the game. The latter had a heavy opponent, but handled him well.

For the Aggies Captain Oswald and Gratais did the best work.

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**WILL REGULATE RUSHING.**  
Sororities at Illinois can work only 12 hours a day.

The fraternity women at the University of Illinois have drawn up the following regulations in respect to rushing:

1. Invitations to join a fraternity shall not be extended to students entering the university in the fall of 1906 for the first time, previous to the fourth Tuesday after the university opens.
2. Previous to this time, no chapter of the fraternities named below shall hint or in any way suggest to a student that she will or may be invited to join any fraternity.
3. During the rushing season, with the exception of the first week of school there shall be no rushing after 7 o'clock p. m., or before 7 o'clock a. m. on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday nights.

no faculty smokers, it might be a cause of hardship to a number of students. However, they regarded a rigid interpretation of the rule as impracticable.

Says Prof. Anderson: "Better have the age limit reduced to 16 years and then have the law really enforced, than to leave the age limit as high as it is now."

Prof. West gave his opinion as follows: "Certainly, I am in favor of enforcing the law against the use of tobacco by minors. The precise age limit may have to be modified by future legislation, but that is not the question."

Prof. McVey said: "The cigarette is one of the means employed by nature for eliminating the unfit." but he said he did not believe the law could be enforced up to the age of 21 years.

Dean Downey said: "I would like to see the law enforced, but I do not think it could be enforced beyond the age of 18 years. If it could be successfully enforced up to that age I would advise its extension to the age of 21."

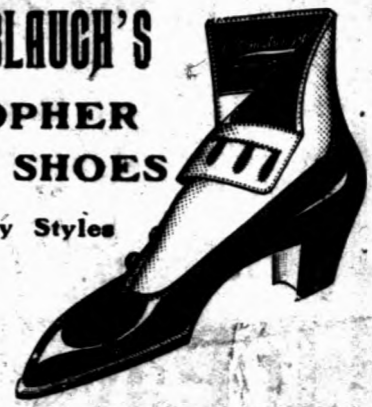
