### ALL-UNIVERSITY CONVOCATION

### NOTICE TO INSTRUCTORS

### NOTICE TO THE DEANS

The time has arrived when a serious effort should be made to get copy for bulletins ready for the printer, especially on the part of those colleges which have required curricula.

The printing regulations of the University Senate require that such colleges—engineering, law, nurses, medicine, mines, pharmacy, dentistry, and the schools of agriculture—shall have bulletin copy in final form for the printer not later than April 15, publication of each bulletin to occur before June 1, bulletins to be printed in the order in which copy is received.

Colleges having elective curricula—science, literature, and the arts; agriculture, forestry and home economics; education; school of chemistry; graduate school—are required to have copy in final form for the printer not later than May 15, publication to occur before July 1.

Last summer bulletins were delayed in large part because of failure to get them in the hands of the printer in accordance with the foregoing requirements. The printing committee cannot prevent delays if bulletin preparation is deferred and the manuscripts are turned in all at once, clogging the University print shop.

## R.O.T.C. SUMMER CAMPS 1920

Students who are interested in training camps to be held this summer should consult one of the officers named below as soon as possible in order that plans may be made for accommodations. Registration for one of these camps does not bind the student to attend if circumstances arise which make attendance impossible but is merely a statement that he expects to go unless prevented by some unforeseen conditions.

### Infantry Camp, Camp Custer, Michigan

Eligible: any freshman member of the R.O.T.C. and any other member of the R.O.T.C. who is not enrolled in Coast Artillery or Signal Corps course. Consult Captain Field of Lieut. Moomau.

### Coast (Heavy) Artillery Camp, Fort Monroe, Virginia

Eligible: any freshman member of the R.O.T.C. and any other member of the R.O.T.C. who is not enrolled in Infantry or Signal Corps course. Consult Captain Walker or Captain Watrous.

### Signal Corps Camp, Camp Vail, New Jersey

Eligible: any freshman in the Electrical Engineering course who is a member of the R.O.T.C. and any other Electrical Engineer who is a member of the R.O.T.C. and who is not enrolled in the Infantry or Coast Artillery courses. Consult M. S. E. Baker.

**Note.**—Attention is called to the fact that any freshman in the R.O.T.C. can register for either the Infantry Camp or the Coast Artillery Camp, according to his own preference without regard to his assignment to any unit during the past year.
