Duluth-- Dr. Richard B. Hey, associate professor, Minnesota Family Study Center, Minneapolis will present the opening address at the spring meeting Saturday (May 1) of the Minnesota Home Economics Association at UMD and the College of St. Scholastica.

An expected 150 delegates will hear Dr. Hey discuss "Women's Divergent Values" at the 9:30 a.m. conference opening in the UMD Home Economics building. Dr. Ruth Palmer, head of the UMD Department of Home Economics, will preside at the sessions.

Dr. Hey joined the University of Minnesota's Family Study Center last fall after work with the Marriage Council of Philadelphia. He is working with the newly established postdoctoral training program in marriage counseling. One of his most popular classes is a functional course in parenthood. He soon will direct a research project dealing with the extension of family life education in the schools.

During a 10:15 coffee break, conferees will view a film "Keys for Tomorrow's Homes."

Dr. Margaret Warning, head of the Department of Textiles and Clothing at Iowa State University, Ames, will speak at 10:45 a.m. on "Textiles and Costumes of India."

Dr. Warning became director of the Iowa State department in 1955. From 1961-63, she taught in a similar department at M.S. University of Baroda, India. While there she worked with postgraduate students.

Miss Marjorie Hanline, field service coordinator for the American Home Economics Association, will discuss headquarters activities at the luncheon at the UMD Campus Club.
